

ASSESSOR HURT IN AUTO CRASH

Machine Skids, Pins Three Under Ditch Water

Frank Hull, county assessor, who was seriously injured Thursday afternoon in an automobile accident on the highway between Auburn and Kent, is resting easier at his home, 823 Madison, Friday afternoon.

Hull, in company with the county assessor of Pierce county, John Harrisburger, engineer for the Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power Co., and M. W. Brockett, attorney for the company, were returning from Electron, Wash., where they had been appraising the power plant, when the accident occurred.

The auto in which Hull was riding swerved out of the road to avoid crashing into a vegetable wagon driven by a Japanese and, skidding, crashed over the bank at the side, turning turtle in its flight and pinning Hull, Harrisburger and Brockett beneath the machine and forcing their heads beneath the water in the ditch. The Pierce county assessor had left the machine prior to the accident.

Witnesses who saw the accident were the assistance of the three and rescued them from their perilous place beneath the machine. Hull suffered a badly wrenched neck and numerous bruises and is suffering from shock and the exposure in the water. Harrisburger and Brockett also were badly injured.

The car, which was a private machine owned by Harrisburger, was not badly damaged.

J. S. Navy Birdmen Routed Dozen Subs

BOSTON, April 18.—French records credited United States naval aviators with having damaged and possibly destroyed 12 German submarines, according to Capt. Thomas C. Raven, U. S. N., commander of all United States naval aviation forces in France, who returned on U. S. S. Agamenon. Mention in the Booze Case Costs Man Job

Mentioned in connection with the \$25,000 booze theft from the U. S. customs appraiser's storeroom, Frank Semple, an employee of the city health department, was summarily dismissed Friday morning by City Health Commissioner Hiram Read. Semple also was ordered by Chief of Police Warren to turn in his police badge.

Dr. Read, Friday morning, declared that any one in his department found connected with anything illicit or illegal will be accorded the same treatment.

Semple has been employed at the city garbage dump as a salvager of junk.

One Suspended

Tom Russell, an employee of the health department, who was arrested Tuesday in connection with the looting of the warehouse and later released on \$2,500 bond, was suspended for 30 days Friday morning by Dr. Read, pending the outcome of the investigations.

Dr. Read believes that Russell is the victim of a mistake on the part of federal officers.

Check Evidence

"Russell has a fine record," he said Friday, "and there is not a mark against him. He has always been faithful, honest and hard-working, and received a splendid recommendation from Dr. McBride when I took over the office. I believe that they made a mistake when they took Tom."

No new arrests were made Friday. Andrew Paine, fireman at the appraiser's storeroom, Western ave. and Lenora st., was questioned Thursday by government officials. He stated that a patrolman whom he did not know, but who answers the description of Patrolman W. F. Patton, according to authorities, talked to him at the warehouse the Sunday night the robbery was committed. Patton is under arrest.

Paine declared Patton talked to him of his work, inquired as to his hours and those of other employees. Paine also told this story to officers from the marshal's office this morning the robbery was discovered.

150,000 Gallons of Beer Thrown Away

LORAIN, April 18.—More than 150,000 gallons of beer were emptied into Black river here.

Federal inspectors ordered the wholesale disposal of the beer when it was learned scores of barrels of it had fermented.

The government ruling that beer may contain only 2 1/2 per cent alcohol is blamed by brewery men. This, they claim, is not sufficient to effect preservation for any length of time.

Stringer Wants Federal Aid in Round-Up

city in car load lots, Sheriff Stringer says the cars are "ditched" on sidings outside the city limits, and the liquor conveyed on the last lap of its journey by auto and auto truck.

Several railroad lines border Lake Washington, some on the east side, where, Stringer says, are dozens of little "stations" where no one lives, but which are designated on maps by names. Here, Stringer says, it is an easy matter to shoot off a car filled with whisky in cases, which are removed as rapidly as possible by auto.

These autos are, in the main, elevated to slip into the city unobserved, although occasionally a car from the sheriff's office or police headquarters captures a "bootleg" auto, loaded with whisky.

PREMIER STIRS UP COMMENT

Different Views Taken by Paris Papers

PARIS, April 18.—(United Press.)—The Temps, discussing Premier Lloyd George's speech before parliament, professes to see in it assurance that Great Britain and the United States would aid France in case she were again attacked by Germany.

Quoting the premier's reference to guarantees, the Temps said: "What, in Lloyd George's opinion, is the stipulation giving France this security? Certainly not annexation of territory; France is not demanding annexations. Not military occupation; this is but temporary. Not the society of nations; because the British opposed both of France's amendments regarding control of armaments and an international military staff."

"What dispositions can other nations assure which would inspire France with a feeling of security? There is only one answer; it is that Great Britain and the United States agree to aid France in the event she is attacked again by Germany. This his discourse said nothing else. It would be singularly enlightening. One can even say all other information paid before it."

Other Paris newspapers, however, took opposite views, contending that Lloyd George's words were empty so far as guarantees for France were concerned. Each paper, in fact, had a different interpretation of the speech.

Fish Strike Ends; Prices Will Drop

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 18.—Fish prices will drop along the coast next week, it was predicted here today, as the striking fishermen boarded their craft and sailed to sea. This action followed the defeat of Harris Weinstein as fish director at Sacramento. The first boats will return tomorrow, when prices are expected to drop.

19,000 RAINBOW TROOPS ON WAY

Big Transport Fleet Sails From Brest

BREST, April 18.—(United Press.)—The port of Brest established a record in troop embarkation, in preparing the remaining units of the 43d (Rainbow) division for sailing yesterday. Nineteen thousand troops, including some portions of the 77th (New York national army) division, marched aboard six transports. Only the 117th ammunition train of the Rainbow division remained, and that will leave tomorrow.

Five of the ships, the Missouri, the Mount Vernon, Pretoria, Pueblo and Huntington were en route today.

The Leviathan, delayed in coaling, was scheduled to start later today.
