The services were under the direction of the Seattle Flyers' club and pallbearers were Seattle aviators in uniform. The casket was draped with the American flag and was borne by Lieuts. L. H. Spafford, Edward Hogg, M. P. Thomas, E. L. Miller, L. A. Green, G. E. Mounce, Norman E. Coles and C. Ebricht. Lieut. Neely was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Neely of this city. Interment was in Lakeview cemetery.

NAVY ENLISTING MANY RECRUITS

Branch Offices Located in Three Cities

The navy recruiting office has been moved from its old location at the First National bank to 36 Madison st. The new offices will be opened Friday. Sub-stations have recently been opened in Olympia, Everett and Wenatchee and recruits are being sent to the receiving ship at Puget sound at the rate of 15 a week. Lieut. R. M. Robinson, in charge of the local office, explaining the bonus plans to discharged men who have not yet received their \$69 checks, said that they would have to send their discharge papers or their orders to inactive duty to the disbursing officer of the bureau of supplies and accounts, navy department, at Washington, D. C.

LIBRARY MORE POPULAR

There was a marked increase in the loan of books from the Seattle Public Library for the first three months of this year over the corresponding months of 1918. According to figures, 447,683 books were loaned during this time, a gain of 58,000 over last year. The central library alone on February 5 loaned 2,500 books.

CUT \$100,000 OFF ESTIMATE

Murphine Prunes Proposals for Car Improvements

Almost \$100,000 has been struck from Supt. Thomas F. Murphine's estimate of needed improvements for the year 1919. The deleted proposals are for the fill around the North Seattle barn, to cost \$75,000, and the removal of the Madison st. bridge, to have cost \$20,000. He substituted two other improvements—a terminal for Yeeler way cable line at Second ave., \$20,000, and track connection at 14th ave. and Pine st., \$5,000. The utilities committee of the council has referred the list back to Murphine for more details on each item.

OLD FORTS OF PARIS GOING TO BE RAZED

(N. E. A. Special to The Star) PARIS, April 18.—The obsolete fortifications surrounding Paris are to be demolished. But there is a movement on foot to preserve at least one bastion as a memorial of the hard fighting its batteries did in the Franco-Prussian war of 1870. The present fortifications were built in 1840.
