GIRL WILL FLY WITH BROTHER

Miss Merle Wolfe Arranges to Take Air Spin

"I want to fly with my brother," Miss Merle Wolfe, whose brother, Lieut. E. L. Wolfe, will arrive here Wednesday with the Flying Circus, faced the flight looking officer at the Liberty Loan headquarters, and made her demand. And when Lieut. Wolfe looks over his bookings for the flight demonstration here, he will find Miss Merle's name at the top of the list.

Miss Merle declares she won't go flying with anybody else; it's got to be her brother.

"I am very anxious to make a flight with my brother, Lieut. E. L. Wolfe, who is in the Flying Circus, and would appreciate very much your approval," says her appeal to Maj. Carl Spatz, who commands the Flying Circus.

"I've always been anxious to fly, and now, since my brother is coming with the Flying Circus, I'd like a chance to take a spin with him. No, I wouldn't fly with any one else," she announced.

A further factor in putting it over on brother is the appended clause in Miss Wolfe's application, absolving the government from all responsibility in case of accident.

Lieut. Wolfe can take her, and she wouldn't fly with any one else," she announced.

Of course, there is no inkling of family objection along this line, but Miss Wolfe is playing safe.

"He doesn't know a thing about it," she smiled, smugly.

Miss Wolfe is employed by the Southern Products Co., but both she and her brother attended the Tacoma high school. Later he graduated from Colgate university, New York.

Lieut. Wolfe received his commission at Rockwell field, where he has been a student and instructor since January, 1918.

Another Northwest boy, Second Lieut. H. W. Wirt, of Wenatchee, is listed in the personnel of the Flying Circus. Lieut. Wirt, who is a '14 graduate of Washington state, was one of the pioneer graduates of the ground school, at Berkeley, and has been identified with Rockwell field for some time.

The train bringing the expert aviators will arrive from Tacoma over the Northern Pacific route at 2:30 a. m. Wednesday, and will leave at 11:30 p. m. for Yakima.
