U. S. OPERATIVES CATCH FUGITIVE

Man of Many Names May Be Tried Here

After eluding United States secret service operatives for nearly a year and leading the government agents a thrilling chase thru most of the big cities of the United States and Canada, William Tilghmann, 30, alleged to be an escaped prisoner from the federal penitentiary at Atlanta, Ga., is in the toils of the law here and may be tried at a counterfeiting charge. Tilghmann was arrested late Thursday at a houseboat on Lake Union.

The federal agents who made the arrest report they found currency notes in the process of bleaching, indicating Tilghmann intended to raise the denominations. Tilghmann traveled under many aliases and when caught was known as F. B. Wilson. He also traveled as Leo Mathever, Walter Wilson and C. V. Hale. He may either be returned to the federal prison at once or held for trial for counterfeiting. He was first convicted of counterfeiting and escaped May 14, 1918.

How Revolutionary Korea Buried Her Monarch



"He killed himself to prevent his son, the prince, from mingling his blood with that of Japan's royal house. He died that Korea might live."

That was the rumor that ran like wildfire around the streets of Seoul during the imperial funeral, shown in the picture. The body of Grand Prince Yi, old Korean ruler, was borne in a catafalque on the shoulders of 500 of his subjects.

Old Prince Yi, under years of Japanese domination, remained a staunch patriot. "Cerebral hemorrhage" was given as the cause of his death. But the people, newly stirred by world-events, didn't believe this. They called it a patriotic suicide. It caused the marriage of Young Prince Yi to be postponed. Japan is sending more and more troops, and the Korean revolt isn't quelled yet.

YANKEES ANGRY AT PROHIBITION

Soldiers Also Oppose Anti-Cigaret Move
