





Seattle Boys and Girls to Stage Swimming Meet

Big Water Carnival to Be Put on at Green Lake Wednesday; Here's List of Events for Seattle Youngsters; Beginners to Get Certificates

Seattle boys and girls will stage a big swimming meet of the year at Green Lake Wednesday, when 11 events will be staged at the Woodland park lake. Certificates will be awarded to the boys and girls who have qualified as swimmers during the summer. They must fulfill five out of a list of seven requirements, the most important of which is to swim a half mile. There are about seven boys and 11 girls who will receive certificates. The events for Wednesday's bill are: Dead man's float. Plunge for distance. Under-water swim. Thirty-yard swim for 1919 beginners. Side stroke. Breast stroke. Treading water. Life saving. Fifty-yard open swim. Seventy-five-yard free-for-all. Diving. The last two events are open to all boys and girls of the Seattle public schools. The other events are limited to the boys and girls of the public swimming classes, conducted at Green Lake, Seward and Mt. Baker parks this year. The events will be for boys and girls separately.
