### Cicotte Sure Bet to Be on Mound for White Sox in First Game of Series

Either Reuther or Sallee Will Be Choice of Pat Moran to Twirl First Mix of Title Games; Schalk and Wingo Will Be Behind the Plate

There is little doubt as to the pitching selection of Kid Gleason for the first game of the world series. Eddie Cicotte will be in the box for the Chicago White Sox.

There is some doubt, however, as to who will do the gunning for the Cincinnati Reds that day. The best guess at this stage of the game appears to be Slim Sallee, veteran National leaguer, who had his baptism of fire in the world series between the Giants and White Sox in 1917. If not Sallee, then Reuther.

Sallee has been going great for the Reds this season. He is a veteran who is undaunted in face of heavy fire from the enemy. He will not show any signs of stage fright when the White Sox cockily advance to the batter's box with clubs swinging menacingly. That is why Slim Sallee is the best guess.

Some say Reuther, and think Reuther will get the assignment because of the fact he has been the best bet of the Reds all season. But Reuther is a youngster compared with Sallee and he might not deliver the goods against the confident and hard-hitting Sox with the veteran star Eddie Cicotte in the box.

#### FIRST WIN VITAL

In a short world series the managers of contending teams always have put forth their strongest front in the opening game. They know what the initial victory means. That is why Kid Gleason will not hesitate in sending Cicotte to the mound the first day. Cicotte has the goods and he is right now at the top of his form. No matter who faces him, the odds will be on the side of the White Sox that day. Cicotte has dropped few games for the Sox this season. And he can be relied on to pitch at his best against the Reds in that first game. It is believed that Sallee can give him the best argument.

The White Sox have been in a world series. The Reds have not. Therefore, the White Sox probably will be inclined to be a little more steady than the Reds opening day. A young pitcher in the box for Cincinnati wouldn't help steady the green world series team. But a veteran world series pitcher would tend to keep the team in balance. That is another argument in favor of Sallee.

A veteran catcher of the National league in discussing the pitching possibilities of the first game, said: Sallee for Reds?

"I haven't talked with Moran about his world series assignments. I do not believe he has said a word as to who he would send in against Cicotte, but it seems to me that Sallee would be the man. He has faced the music before and was cool and collected under fire. That first game will be a hard one on the pitcher. Both teams will fight hard for the opening contest, because it means much to them. Both pitchers will be under a verbal fire that afternoon—goat-getting tactics by every member of the opposing team. Cicotte can pitch as well in a barrage of taunts as on a field where only his admirers were assembled. Sallee can, too. Whether the younger pitchers of the Reds could stand the strain is doubtful. If it isn't Sallee, tho, it will be Reuther. Dutch is one of the best pitchers in the game this year.

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

### SPORTING GOSSIP

HEARD ABOUT TOWN BY LEON LASSEN

The local boxing commission is scheduled to get under way today. The commission, consisting of Charlie Hulen, Al Wisnolek and Dr. Hanley, will elect a chairman and formulate a system of rules. The meeting is billed for the city hall. A lot of fans around town are wondering who Dr. Hanley is and what his qualifications are for the job on the commission. To enlighten them, Dr. Hanley is the physician who has been examining the boxers for local shows during the past few years. He worked in this capacity for Austin & Salt during the past season. As for the chairmanship of the commission there doesn't seem to be much question as to whom is best fitted for the job. Just what Wisnolek's claims as a boxing authority are is a riddle to a lot of fans, while the doctor will have enough to do to examine boxers. On the other hand Charlie Hulen is one of the best posted men on the ring game in the city and deserves the chairmanship without question.

Seattle baseball fans who have been without baseball during the past three weeks while the Siwash were in foreign fields, will see the local aggregation in action for two more weeks, starting tomorrow, when the Angels open a week's series here. Wade Kilfer's bunch is far in the van of the Seattle crew, but Seattle is a different team on the home field than in the territory of the enemy. The local pitchers have been going bad, with Thomas and Schorr both out of the fray. Charlie Mullen, who was injured in the final game of the series with Portland when a grounder banged him over the right eye, knocking him unconscious, will probably be out for the rest of the season, which means that Jack Knight will go back to his job at first base. Sacramento closes the season here next week.

When the team goes out on the field here tomorrow it will be a slightly different squad than the one that lined up here three weeks ago. Bill Kenworthy, who was let out by the Angels, will hold down the shortfield job; young Sands, a new infielder, is at third, and Jack Knight will be at first base. Ray French has lost out at shortstop because of his failure to hit.

Joe Dailer, former Seattle Northwestern league pitcher, who has been going strong in the sticks around Seattle lately, will join the Seattle squad today. He is the property of the Detroit Americans and Seattle has permission to use him. He was with Portland for a short time but refused to work for the salary that McCredie offered him.

Jack Knight, local infielder, has proved to be a very useful man around the local inner works. Jack has held down all four jobs on the inner defense since the season started. He played the third base bag and was then shifted to the keystone sack. For a while he took a fling at third base again, and is now back on first after a brief stay at shortstop.

Andy Smith, coach of the California football squad, has been beating the conference ruling that no tournaments should be held until September 15, because some schools had the quarterly system in which the fall terms began October 1, as is the case at Washington. Smith didn't have any formal turnout but he did have class games in which the men were given a chance to get in condition ahead of the other schools in the conference. Such practices doesn't make winners by a long shot.

**CUE ARTISTS BARRED FROM BIG TOURNNEY**

Augie Kieckhafer, former world's champion, and Bob Cannefax, the present champion, were denied franchises in the Interstate Billiard league, with the announcement of the awarding of franchises by Secretary Ed. Teim of Cleveland. The league this season will comprise 12 players. Play will start October 10. Each game will consist of 100 points played in blocks of 50 on consecutive nights. There will be a total of 264 games covering a period of 23 weeks of play. Five new cities, Buffalo, Cincinnati, Akron, Youngstown and Pittsburgh, were taken into the league. The other members of the league are Chicago, Detroit, Cleveland, Milwaukee and St. Louis. The prize list will total \$4,750, the amounts being \$1,000, \$800, \$650, \$500, \$450, running down to four prizes of \$100 for the last four players.

Joe Wilhelm, of the Wichita team, of the Western league, who recently established a record of hitting in consecutive games, has scored 121 runs in as many games.

### AT THE TRAPS

There is a shortage of guns and supplies, according to J. A. Cook, of the Remington Arms Company, who is in Seattle. He says his company cannot meet the orders, due to the late start by the manufacturers, who are just rounding into pre-war operation.

The last regular shoot of the present season is billed for a week from Sunday when the Green Lake shooters will stage a merchandise shoot.

The Green Lake gunners hope to be shooting at the Fort Lawton traps this winter.

Many of the local gunners are planning to forsake the traps to use their artillery in the fields and hills of Washington in game and bird hunting soon.

The chick season is closed in Kittitas county, but it is open season for Hancarian partridge in that county.

### HOSPITAL MEN TO HOLD FIELD MEET

Letterman General Hospital, San Francisco, plans a unique athletic meet among soldiers injured in the great war. The events will be run off the latter part of the present month, including, wheel chair race; boxing match between men with one arm; another between men with one leg; wooden-leg race between contestants with one artificial leg; another similar race between men with both artificial legs, and race stringing beads. There are 1,800 patients in the hospital.

### BIG SQUAD ANSWERS VARSITY GRID CALL

With a sprinkling of veterans, some 50 candidates answered the first football call of the season at the University of Washington yesterday. No heavy work was staged, but the grid will start within a couple of days when the old-timers are expected to be on the job. Bill Grimm, tackle; Lawrence Smith, center; Ross Williams, quarter; Buell Blake, guard and punter, are some of the veterans who were out.

### SQUADS ARE ON CLOSING LAP OF RACE

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 23.—With the Angels in the lead of Vernon by a game and a half, the next to the last week's series started today in the Pacific Coast league.

The outlook is favorable for the Seraphs, who meet the tail-end Seattle club at the Northern city, while the Tigers will have to withstand the heavy assaults of the Salt Lake Bees at Los Angeles. The Bengals and the Bees broke even in the series just finished at the Mormon city.

Oakland and San Francisco, occupying fifth and sixth places, respectively, enter their last home week in the Bay district.

The Yippers will spread their noise in Portland, the latter club just having covered itself with glory by taking six out of the seven-game series with the Rainiers.

### MORAN OFFERS HIGH PRICES

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Sept. 23.—To fortify himself with star outfielders for next season, Manager Pat Moran of the pennant winning Cincinnati Reds has made two huge offers for the two star outfielders of the American association this season. These offers were made some time ago, prior to the acquisition of Pat Duncan from Birmingham, and they still stand. One was for \$15,000 for Tim Hendryx of the Louisville club and the other of \$12,000 for Elmer Miller of the St. Paul club.
