

MONTERANO, Sept. 23.—Mrs. Edna Heath, of Hoquiam, charged with having forged checks on the Hoquiam and Aberdeen Red Cross, pleaded guilty Saturday, and was given a minimum sentence of six months in the county jail. The law fixes the maximum at 15 years.

Mrs. Heath, at the time of her arrest in Hoquiam, claimed that her husband, formerly in the army, had money coming from the government as sick benefits, and that she had merely drawn the checks against the fund which had been made payable thru the Red Cross.

Alaska Railway to Be Finished in 1923

The Alaskan railroad should be completed by 1923 at the latest, John W. Halliwell, assistant secretary of the interior, told Seattle business men at a luncheon in the Army and Navy club Monday.

The luncheon was under the auspices of the Alaska bureau of the Chamber of Commerce. Dr. Alfred H. Brooks, of the United States geological survey, spoke briefly on Alaska's mineral resources.

City Prisoners to Get Outside Work

Sheriff John Stringer's offer to care for city prisoners at the county stockade at the Willows at 50 cents a day was accepted by the city council Monday.

Hereafter all city prisoners sentenced to five days or more will be housed at the Willows and will be put to work outside.
