### COTTON YIELD BELOW NORMAL

Poundage This Year Drop From 1918 Total


WASHINGTON, Oct. 3.—(United Press.)—The 1919 cotton crop was forecast at a yield per acre of 153 pounds with a total production of 10,698,000 bales today by the agricultural department on the basis of reports of field agents indicating the condition of the crop on September 25 at 54.4 per cent of normal. In 1918 production was 12,040,532 bales.

Cotton ginned to September 5 from the 1919 and 1918 crops totaled 1,854,170 running bales, counting round bales as half bales, the census bureau announced today. Cotton ginned to the same time last year totaled 3,770,611 running bales.

### "Oriental Irritants" Is How Yank Describes Japanese In Siberia

The overbearing and grasping attitude of the Japanese army in Siberia has brought from Kenneth L. Roberts, who was in Siberia with the American forces, an article in the October Cosmopolitan headed, "Oriental Irritants," in which he takes strong sides with Senator James D. Phelan's warnings against the aggressions of that race.

This exposition of the offensive attitude of the Japanese toward the American soldiers and the disposition of the troops, accompanied by merchants from Japan, to loot harmless Russians and obtain control by extortion and predatory acquisition of valuable property in Siberia, calls for earnest study and reflection by the Pacific coast.

Tried to Hang Yank  
The incident of an attempt to hang an American soldier at Spasskoy by the captain of a Japanese troop is first-hand information, and should open the eyes of doubters. Roberts saw the things that he wrote about.

In concluding the article, he refers dramatically to one of the speeches of Senator James D. Phelan in the United States senate, in which he terms the Japanese "the Huns of the East." Here is the way reference is made by the author to Senator Phelan's statements:

"Not long ago, Senator Phelan, democrat of California, made oration in Washington. He referred genially to the Japanese as 'the Huns of the East.' He stated positively that America's next war would be on the Pacific and not on the Atlantic.

"If I had read this speech a year ago, I would have yawned heavily and made a few caustic and nonsensical remarks about California men who were so excited on the

Japanese question that they couldn't look at a Japanese lantern without throwing a fit, or pass a garden containing Japanese irises without biting themselves in the arm and being threatened with hydrophobia.

### Different View Now

"But, during the past year, I have had a look at the Japanese army; so, today, Senator Phelan's speech doesn't call up even a fraction of an ounce of caustic in me. It merely sets me to writing to the senators who represent my state at Washington. And my letters start about like this:

"Dear Senator: "Please glance at Senator Phelan's speech on the Japanese. The only trouble with Senator Phelan in his conservative and backward attitude on the Japanese question. The subject calls for profanity, and Senator Phelan hasn't used any. I understand that you expect to run again for the senate at the expiration of your present term. If you want my vote, Senator, kindly see to it that you are able to take care of ourselves on the Pacific under any and all conditions."

"And that's what you'd have written your senator if you had ever seen anything of the Japanese army."

### U. S. AVIATORS DIED IN MEXICO

American Tells of Finding Bodies Buried in Desert

NOGALLES, Ariz., Oct. 3.—(United Press.)—A spot apparently of blood, on the shirt of one of the two lost army aviators whose bodies were found September 21, at Barrio de Los Angeles, Lower California, by Joseph Allen Richards, of Chicago, was the only possible indication of how the aviators died, Richards declared today.

A report that the airplane is lying on a mesa about 15 miles from where the aviators were found has not been verified. The two aviators, Lieutenants Frederick B. Warrinerhouse, of Weiser, Idaho, and Cecil H. Connolly, of San Diego, had been missing since August 26, when they left San Diego on a patrol flight over the Mexican border. Barrio de Los Angeles is in the heart of an uninhabited country. There is but one resident there, an aged Mexican recluse, who disclaimed all knowledge of the aviators.

Richards in a statement to the United Press today told of finding the bodies when he went ashore from the steamer Navari, to replenish the vessel's water supply while en route to Guaymas.

### Bodies Buried

"About 20 feet back from the high water mark I saw the skull of a man sticking out of the ground," he said. "Further search revealed two bodies, buried in about 12 inches of sand. On the smaller man I found the bar of a lieutenant, wings of the aviation corps and leather leggings marked 'Hannan Brothers, New York.'"

"On the larger man I found gold cuff buttons marked with the letter 'C', eagle wings and propeller bar insignia. Both bodies wore whipcord pants with coveralls over the uniforms. I dug deeper graves and buried the bodies."

The steamer Provincia, whose captain has Richards' signed statement, is now en route to Tacoma, Wash.

### JAPS CHARGE U. S. WANTS RAILROAD TO EUROPE VIA SIBERIA

TOKYO, Oct. 3.—Jap newspapers are commenting adversely on a report that the United States is seeking a lease of Kamchatka from the Omsk government and the right to build railroads there. "America has long dreamed of constructing a railway from her west coast to Europe across Canada, via the Behring straits, and then across Siberia," says Tamato. "The despotism inherent in this proposal is even more reprehensible than the militaristic aggressiveness as practiced by Germany. How can the world's sense of justice permit such a proposal?"

### LONDON BOASTS OF REAL QUARTIER LATIN

LONDON, Oct. 3.—Baron Edmond de Rothschild has placed a house in London at the disposal of the Academie des Beaux Arts. It is to be used as a hostel for artists as well as for young people engaged in literary and scientific work generally—a new miniature Quartier Latin. At this hostel young people will be relieved at least of some of the pressing anxieties of the art of living and will be able to devote themselves to work and study.

Local papers, including the Westminster Gazette, suggest that some wealthy Englishman should reciprocate by establishing a similar idea in Paris, "and the two ideas might be run with common ideas and principles."

### GIRL SMOKERS FINED, JAILED IN MILWAUKEE

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 3.—Cigarette smoking by women is looked on with disfavor in Milwaukee. "Gustie" Schultz of Kenosha was riding down Grand ave. in a motor car smoking a cigaret when a traffic officer saw her. He stopped the car and reprimanded her as gently as he could.

Ethel Weninger, arrested in a cafe, was charged also with smoking cigarets. The judge said he hoped 60 days in the house of correction would make her discontinue smoking.

JAIL FOR BEATING HORSE  
LONDON, Oct. 3.—For beating a horse with a spanner, Richard Orchard was sent to jail for a month at hard labor by the Linslade magistrate.


