MINE LABORERS IN OTHER WORK

Seek Better Pay, Says Union Secretary

Because they can obtain higher wages in other lines of industry for the same class of work, common laborers in coal mines throughout the state of Washington did not return to work Monday in any except four or five mines, according to Ernest Newsham, district secretary of the United Mine Workers.

"Many have already left the mines," said Newsham. "Others refuse to go to work until the matter of wages is adjusted. They are not on strike but merely refuse to work for the wages offered."

Common laborers in mines, Newsham said, are paid at the present scale \$5.20 a day. Other industries offer \$6 for common laborers such as shovemen. Mine workers are said to be considered more dangerous than work above ground and for this reason the men prefer less hazardous employment, wages being taken into account, Newsham said.

Mine operators met Sunday and made final preparations to resume the digging of coal, according to N. D. Moore, spokesman. "We feel sure," he said, "that the men would return to work if not adversely influenced."

Aged Resident of Seattle Dies Here

Mrs. Marilda Ferris Stratton, whose parents' home in Kansas during the Civil war was one of the stations on the underground railway by which many slaves made their escape to safety, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. James Funchion, 4211 Holly st., at 3:30 a. m. Monday.

Mrs. Stratton was a resident of Seattle for more than 30 years and a pioneer of Whitman county. She was 89 and had been in failing health for several years. Pneumonia developed a week ago.

She was the widow of Horace F. Stratton, who died here 17 years ago, and leaves three children here, Mrs. Funchion, wife of a pioneer Alaska mining man, and two sons, Curtis D. and Dwight F. Stratton, Seattle newspapermen.

Funeral services will be held from Bonney-Watson's at a date to be fixed later.

COCK REPLACES EAGLE

PARIS, Nov. 17.—The imperial eagle at the entrance to Kehl bridge, on the left bank of the Rhine at Strasburg, which was pulled down from its pedestal soon after the French troops occupied the city, has just been replaced by the Galleo cock facing Germany in a defiant attitude, without outspread wings. When the order was given to make the new emblem it was intended to utilize the statue of King Wilhelm I at Strasburg supposed to be of bronze, but on examination the metal turned out to be a sort of composition which could not be used again.

LYNN, Mass., Nov. 17.—When fire crews from three stations responded to an alarm in the factory district they found a cow tied to the alarm box, peacefully chewing her cud.
