50 New Policemen for Oakland Force

OAKLAND, Cal., March 18.—Fifty extra policemen will be added to the Oakland department following the adoption of an ordinance providing for the increase.

Industrial conditions, strike riots and assaults, according to Police Commissioner Morse, make the ordinance necessary. Its passage followed demands of the Chamber of Commerce and various industries for the protection in the face of industrial unrest.

The additional force will cost Oakland \$21,600 annually, according to Morse.

MEXICO CITY, March 18.—The foreign office has instructed the Mexican consul at El Paso, Tex., not to issue passports to 11 Americans desiring to enter Mexico.


