

REVOLT BREAKS IN ISLE OF MAN

"No Taxation Without Representation," Is Cry

LONDON, March 18.—No taxation without representation! Some 140 odd years after the American colonists shouted this in defiance of King George III of England, the same battle cry is being raised by the people of the little Isle of Man who are ruled by George V of England. And their voice will probably be heard in parliament.

The Isle is ruled by a lieutenant governor and an upper council named by the crown and by a house of keys elected by the people. The council and the keys get together and form the legislative body known as the Tynwald.

HOUSE OF KEYS TAKES DRASTIC STEP
Apparently with the approval of the taxpayers, the house of keys has taken the drastic step of refusing to meet with the lieutenant governor and the upper council because salaries have been increased without their consent. The salary raises amount to \$100,000, which is equal to about one-fourth of the revenues before the war.

It is estimated that other raises, bound to follow, will run it up to \$250,000. A much higher rate of pay has been given the police, who it is claimed have a hard time finding anything to do except when the summer tourists have also been favored. The gist of the complaint is that the increases have been granted without consultation with the parliamentary body elected by the Manxmen themselves. They say in the last resort this means the Isle is governed by permanent officials at the home office in London who have responsibility neither to the British house of commons nor to the Manx people.

MANX PEOPLE DEMANDING REFORMS
The Manx are particularly peeved because they have no old age pensions and state insurance such as the rest of Britain has, being told that such luxuries cannot be afforded. They are therefore asking why the luxury of raising salaries can be afforded.

They are demanding a reform in their constitution and the house of keys is being strongly backed up by the folk of the little island which sent 8,000 out of its population of 52,000 to fight for the empire.

Johnson Claims Victory in Minnesota Primaries

SAN FRANCISCO, March 18.—Senator Hiram Johnson claims that he won a remarkable victory in the Minnesota primary, according to a statement he has wired to his campaign headquarters here from Toledo. The statement follows:

"Reports of Minnesota pretense of primary wholly misleading, just as reports sent out of that state before the contest were untrue. Originally, Associated Press news indicated only Wood and Lowden were real contenders and blanketed me.

"Minnesota had a legal preferential primary. The governor repealed it. The state administration has complete control of the state organization. It called a primary with a preferential presidential vote and fixed time for hour between 7:30 and 8:30 at night. It is midwinter in Minnesota with roads almost impassable. I asked half a day for people to vote. Lowden and Hoover forces joined in demanding. State machine making Wood fight refused. I asked friends in Minneapolis and St. Paul to go to it anyway.

"My advice are I have carried

Minneapolis and Hennepin county and perhaps St. Paul. No primaries were held in many county precincts, but returns are being sent in by machine leaders.

"Under the circumstances, I won a remarkable victory and carried the big cities, where it was possible to vote at all. Associated Press, of course, gives different complexion to whole thing.
