

Aviation News By Wing Slip

That it is not municipalities alone that are blind to the inevitable development of the airplane was indicated Friday by the sorrowful statement of Col. W. P. Pearson, administrative officer of the army air service.

Col. Pearson was asked by Representative John F. Miller to state the army's attitude toward the proposal that the King county commissioners give to the government the Sand Point aviation field site, near Seattle. "Under the depleted strength of the air service," wrote Col. Pearson, "it will be impossible for us to furnish personnel for the operation of the Sand Point field, in the event of the procurement of the field. The air service will, of course, be glad to make use of it whenever service airplanes are in that vicinity. It is hoped that the field will be obtained, and thus add another link to the fast-increasing chain of landing fields in the country."

It is almost unnecessary to comment on the policy of an administration which will allow such an important branch of its military forces to starve for lack of appropriations. Col. Pearson's statement is equivalent to an admission that the army air service is yearly in the same comatose condition it was at the start of the war. The mess that the army made of the air service in the World War is only too fresh in the memory of the people of the United States.

A repetition of the mistakes that the American army made in aviation would be fatal in the next war, for the air service is now recognized by all other powers as constituting the most important branch of any army. The United States air service, so far as equipment and organization went, was a joke at the beginning of the war against Germany. It is now on its way, thru the short-sighted policy of a mouthing congress, to become a joke in the event of another war.

METROPOLITAN

"Maytime," Messrs. Shubert's most successful musical production, comes to the Metropolitan theatre Sunday night for the week with the identical cast, headed by Carolyn Thomson and William Norris, that appeared in New York and remained there for two years, Chicago seven months and Boston six months. Produced in New York in August, 1917, the present company has been appearing in "Maytime" continuously ever since, and yet only the leading cities have been visited.

The four acts or episodes of "Maytime" are as distinct, one from the other, as tragedy from comedy. The first episode occurs in 1840. Then the lovers, Dick and Otilie, are in their teens. To save the situation Otilie's cousin Matthew declares that they were tears of happiness over the fact that Dick has come back to ask for the hand in marriage of Otilie's friend, Alice Tremaine. Dick proposes to Alice, and thus saves the situation. The next scene brings the characters into old age, and finally in the last episode the principal people, Mr. Stokes and Miss Thomson, are seen as the grandchildren of the original lovers and, of course, these children are happily married.

Another attractive feature of the same bill is the appearance of Rita Mario and Company, which is a rather modest title for an aggregation of wonderfully talented musical artists consisting of nine young women and one man. Rita Mario, the talented virtuoso and leader, pre-

sentations what might be termed the most artistically entertaining act in musical vaudeville. Soles for harp, violin and cello are intermingled with the ensemble numbers.

Charles Howard and Company will offer "A Happy Combination." It is a fast vehicle well lubricated with fun. Donald Roberts and Victoria Gale assist.

Shelton Brooks, the popular song writer, assisted by Horace George, celebrated clarinetist, has an act of music and fun. Brooks will be remembered as the composer of "All Night Long," "Some of These Days," "Walking the Dog" and "Strutters Ball."

"And Son" is a comedy playlet filled with bright dialogue presented by Howard Smith and Company.
