Grenadine Is Revived for New Negligee

 So many negligees and gissoles are impracticable, perishable things, that it is a satisfaction to present this one. It is of—what do you think! Grenadine—the very same sort of material that our grandmothers and great-grandmothers adored for their summery best frocks. The grenadine here used was imported from Japan and this particular piece has a green and gray stripe. The negligee itself has first, two straight lengths of the material sewed up half their length to form a back—then a lining of green silk is applied and the whole hung kimono-fashion, except that the fronts are hoisted a trifle and caught at the top to provide a hint of drapery. Very soft-toned green ostrich feathers around the neck add a telling effect.

USE PAINT BRUSH FOR DUSTING

A painter's soft brush is most useful for dusting woodwork and fiber furniture.
 Long years ago when inside blinds were the vogue this sort of brush was in constant use for the exclusive purpose of dusting the blinds. When the blinds were relegated to the discard the brush was found to be very much worth while for dusting.
 Brushed covers may be quickly brushed off and the table made tidy without removing the entire array of books and magazines and lamp.
 Upholstered furniture that receives daily dusting with a soft brush keeps in good condition.
 The softness of the bristles eliminates all possible danger of scratching the highest polish.

RHUBARB CUSTARD PIE

2 cups diced rhubarb
 1 cup sugar
 1 teaspoon butter
 1 tablespoon flour
 1/4 cup water
 1 egg
 2 tablespoons pulverized sugar
 Pour boiling water over rhubarb. Let stand five minutes and pour off water. Put rhubarb in a sauce pan, add sugar and water and bring to a boil. Add butter and flour dissolved in a little cold water and cook, stirring constantly, till thick. Add yolk of egg and stir well. Bake in an under pie crust. Beat white of egg till stiff and dry and beat in pulverized sugar. Put on top of pie and brown in a hot oven.

REMEDY FOR INSECTS
 A remedy for the plant louse and the red spider is a tablespoonful of extract of nicotine added to a gallon of water. The aphid and meale bug are destroyed by dipping the foliage in strong soap suds. Fir tree oil is best remedy for scale, which attacks such smooth-leaved plants as ivy and palms.

Sunday School Teacher Comments on Bible Study

Dear Miss Cynthia Grey: The letters you published regarding prayer and Bible reading in the public schools are very interesting, not only to me, but to all who wish to see future American citizens started out on the right road. Whether the next generation believes in God and the right principles of living, is of tremendous importance to our country, and from a patriotic sense of duty alone, the fundamentals of Christianity should be taught in our schools.
 I think in the past one reason why reading the Bible and prayer were discontinued in the public schools

was the difference in creeds, and the fear that some sect might abuse the privilege. But the laws contained in the Ten Commandments have never been improved upon by even the wisest judges through the ages, and if, in addition, the Golden Rule was taught and practiced, this world would be a happier place to live in. Neither Jew, Gentile nor Catholic could find any criticism with the simple reading of the Bible and the Lord's Prayer to start the school day.

Our Lincoln high school has engraved over one of its doors, the word "Reverence," and I believe it is the desire of the teachers to teach reverence, not only of God, but of the rights and feelings of others, which of course, includes "Courtesy," especially in the aged or weak.

A few years ago our high schools offered special credits to scholars who attended Sunday school regularly, and I think this was a fine thing.
