"Happy," Little Blind Terrier, Is Pearl White's Best Pal





Chief petty officers, \$124 a month; petty officer, first class, \$84; second class, \$72; third class, \$60; non-rated men, first class, \$54; second class, \$48; third class, \$33; firemen, first class, \$60; second class, \$54; third class, \$48; cooks and stewards, pay ranging from \$84 to \$60; mess attendants, pay ranging from \$62 to \$33.
