## \$18 MINIMUM IS CONSIDERED

### Welfare Commission Takes It Under Advisement

After listening to employers protest against the \$18 weekly women's wage approved at joint conference in Olympia, and to women labor representatives heckle these protesters, the industrial welfare commission had under advisement Friday the protest.

Decline of prices throughout the country was advanced by employers as a reason why the minimum should not be raised from the existing \$12.50.

That a working girl's yearly expenses come to \$1,200 was the claim advanced by Miss Jean Stovel, labor organizer, in a report filed. She said an \$18 minimum was acceptable, however.

## COMAN SPEAKS ON STATE WORK

### Opposed to Socialism and Carlyon Road Bill

Opposition to the socialization of the state, to the release of political prisoners and to the placing of heavier financial burdens on the public were voiced by State Senator Ed T. Coman, candidate for governor, in an address Thursday before the Young Men's Republican club of King county.

Coman went on record as being opposed to the Carlyon road bonding bill to be voted on at the coming election.

"Good roads are evidence of the prosperity and progress of a community and should be built as rapidly as funds are available and conditions warrant," he declared. "I am opposed to the imposition of a \$10,000,000 debt upon the state for the purpose of expediting our road program a few years."

A campaign of education in the schools to combat the propaganda of the I. W. W., the nonpartisan league and the Bolsheviks was advocated by Senator Coman, who declared that the foreign element should be taught the fundamentals of Americanism before they fall into the hands of demagogues and agitators.

Senator Coman is the first of the gubernatorial candidates to be heard before the Young Men's Republican club. Col. R. H. Hartley, of Everett, will be the speaker at next Thursday's meeting.

## TENNESSEE IS COMMISSIONED

### Woman Raises Flag Over Supership

NEW YORK, June 3.—Miss Marjorie Oakes, of Nashville, Tenn., standing on the deck of the super-dreadnaught Tennessee Thursday afternoon completed the ceremony commissioning the battleship, one of the largest fighting boats in the world, when she raised the American flag to float over the vessel.

Miss Oakes was the first woman ever to raise the flag of a battleship at its commissioning. She represented Governor Roberts of Tennessee, who was unable to be present.

The ship will have a crew of 1,200 men, of which number 600 are native Tennesseans, recruited for the vessel thru the efforts of Governor Roberts and other residents of that state.

The Tennessee has 12 14-inch guns, 14 5-inch guns and four anti-aircraft guns. The 14-inch guns will throw a total of 16,000 pounds of shells a distance of 20 miles and will be able to fire such a broadside every 20 seconds. The ship will be propelled by electricity.

### Cider Was Too Hard; Fined

E. J. Lemenix and W. Wilmers, dealers in alleged soft cider, were fined \$200 in the United States district court Thursday afternoon. Lemenix was assessed two-thirds of the amount.

### Fined \$500 for Tugging It Over

Ellsworth E. Robertson, found guilty by a jury in the United States district court Wednesday of smuggling liquor into Seattle from Canada on the tug Monitor, was fined \$500 by Federal Judge Neterer Thursday afternoon.

### Admits He Had It; Fined \$200

Herbert Koib admitted the illegal possession of certain alcoholic liquids in violation of the national prohibition law and was fined \$200 Thursday afternoon when arraigned in the United States district court.

### Acquit Chauffeur of Booze Charge

Frank Carr, chauffeur, was acquitted of liquor transportation charges by a jury in the United States district court Thursday afternoon.

## LOS ANGELES IS AFTER \$500,000

### Seattle After Half That for Publicity Purposes

With records hung up by the three high teams in yesterday's canvass as the goal for today's canvass for the Chamber of Commerce annual budget of \$250,000, the 200 workers, under the direction of six majors and six captains, got into the third day's canvass with more vim. Early reports indicated that in addition to the signing of a number of large budget subscribers many of the smaller subscribers had increased their last year's subscription and new pledges were received from men who have not contributed in previous years.

This noon at the members' lunch, encouraging reports were given to J. W. Spangier, chairman of the general committee.

The chamber has advertising copy in offices of Eastern publishers awaiting telegraphic release which will be given when the budget, which makes allowance for an annual expenditure of \$100,000 for national advertising, is raised.

Los Angeles is in the "national advertising game," says word from that city, where a fund of \$10,000, from seven Southern California counties, is being raised.
