HANDS TIED TO BACK AND SLAIN

May Have Been Missing R. O. Walters

The body of a man believed to be R. O. Walters, 36, a logger, was found murdered in the Snohomish river, east of Everett, Thursday afternoon. The dead man's hands were tied behind his back.

Walters' disappearance was reported to the Seattle police on May 15 by George Bassett, Oak hotel. Walters was living at the time in the Virginia hotel and had about \$200 in his possession.

The description of the dead man tallies with that of Walter, the police declared. The body was found by employees of the Ferry-Baker mill. Deputy Coroner Charles H. Fickel took charge of the body and reported that Everett police records do not show a missing man for several months.

A pair of glasses, some cigar papers, a comb, some change and several keys were found in the dead man's pockets. The clothing was ready-made and bore union labels. Two handkerchiefs, bearing the initials "J" were also found in the pockets.

Seattle police are searching Friday for Bassett to have him view the body.

TWO ARRESTS IN KIDNAPING CASE

Woman Servant and Man Held in Pennsylvania

NORRISTOWN, Pa., June 4.—Catherine Dundon, who was employed as cook in the home of George Coughlin here for three days last April, was taken from her cell today and questioned at length by detectives concerning the kidnaping of the 13-month-old Coughlin baby, Blakely.

She was arrested last night on suspicion that she might have been the "plant" for the actual kidnapers, now believed to have been two men. James Malone, 27, was later taken into custody and will be questioned in connection with the kidnaping.

PARENTS OFFER \$6,000 REWARD

Authorities refused to reveal what evidence they have regarding Mrs. Dundon.

One letter was received by the parents since the child was kidnaped. It was in response to this that the parents today inserted an advertisement in newspapers offering \$6,000 reward for information regarding the whereabouts of the baby.

The kidnapers had accurate knowledge of the location of the nursery and of the arrangement of furniture in the room, the detectives believe, which must have been furnished by someone who had access to the house, and which enabled them, without waking any member of the household, to steal the baby from its crib at 2 o'clock in the morning.

Thus far the detectives have failed to establish a motive for the crime. Had it been committed with the idea of holding the infant for ransom, it is believed, some word from the kidnapers would by this time have been forthcoming.

So far as could be learned from members of the stricken family today, Coughlin, the father, had no enemies who might have stolen his baby for revenge. He and Mrs. Coughlin have not yet given up hope that the child is still alive.

NO CHARGE AGAINST WOMAN AS YET

After her questioning, Mrs. Dundon was again locked in her cell incommunicado. Detectives would not discuss what she had told them. No charge has been placed against her as yet.

She is past middle age, apparently about 50. She was arrested in Conshohocken, Pa., where she said she had been working recently. Whether she is the Coughlin's former employer, she was discharged or quit is unknown. It was said today merely that she was not a satisfactory cook.

Fail to Find Body of Drowned Man

Continued dragging of the water at Pier 5 failed to reveal the body of A. Wilcox, seaman, who fell from the side of the steamer West Ivan Thursday and was drowned.

Capt. A. M. Wenerlund, of the West Ivan, told the police that Wilcox had been hired last Saturday and was painting eight feet above the water when he fell. He was standing on a staging swung over the vessel's side. Jack Pearce, waterfront laborer, saw Wilcox take his fatal plunge and leaped into the water after him. Wilcox sunk immediately, Pearce declared, and never came to the surface again.

Captain Wenerlund declared Wilcox stopped at the Right hotel, but was unable to furnish any information about the drowned man's relatives.

Gen. Manuel Pelaez Says He Is Loyal

MEXICO CITY, June 4.—Gen. Manuel Pelaez, following a conference last night with Gen. Alvaro Obregon and Adolfo de la Huerta, provisional president of the republic, issued a statement supporting the revolutionary government. He said he would aid in the establishment of civil order and authority in the Mexican oil fields.

In explaining his action recently in collecting \$1,500,000 in "taxes" from the American oil companies in the vicinity of Tampico Pelaez declared it was absolutely necessary in order to pay his troops, which have provided protection to foreign oil companies.

Sgt. Alvey, Former Policeman, Dead

After a prolonged illness, Sgt. W. J. Alvey, retired police officer, died at 2 p. m. Friday at his home at 1806 E. 73rd st. Chief of Police William Searing was notified of Sgt. Alvey's death by Mrs. Eva L. Alvey, the dead officer's wife.

Sgt. Alvey was born in Detroit, Mich., and joined the Seattle police department November 1, 1904. He was promoted to a sergeant on January 1, 1920. Sgt. Alvey was a Spanish-American war veteran and leaves a son, Melvin G., and a daughter, Amelia C., as well as his widow. Funeral arrangements have not yet been announced.

Australia Seamen Support Deportee

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 4.—The seamen's union of Australia, at the instance of Tom Walsh, who married Sylvia Pankhurst, has resolved not to sail a vessel carrying as a deportee a German Catholic priest named Father Jerger.

That the priest and other deportees to sail on the same boat "did not have a fair, open trial" is the complaint of Walsh. The Irish community of Sydney is supporting Father Jerger and the feeling is running high, almost culminating in riots in connection with radical meetings.

LEGION SCORES WILLIAM BOUCK

Sedition Laws Denounced by Him in Speech

ABERDEEN, Wash., June 4.—Resolutions spread today on the minutes of the Aberdeen American Legion post denounce William Bouck, state grange master, for his speech at the state grange convention here yesterday, branding it as un-American and not reflecting the sentiments of the decent American farmers of the state.

Bouck flayed congress for passing sedition laws, urged the release of conscientious objectors, attacked the deportation of undesirable aliens and advocated repeal of the syndicalism law.

Legion post members were called together and informed of what had been done. They unanimously favored a counter-resolution scoring Master Bouck and upholding the syndicalist act as commendable in that it was designed to curb the I. W. W., an organization "criminal in its methods, murderous in its practices, and treasonable in its purposes."
