BASE HITS CARRY SEATTLE OUT OF CELLAR; ELDRID PRODUCES PUNCH

It took the good old-fashioned base knock yesterday to hoist the Seattle Siwash out of the Coast league cellar into sixth place, passing up Sacramento and Oakland. In an orgy of hits and runs, errors and thrills, Seattle romped home with the second straight win over the Oaks, winning 8 to 6 when "Brick" Eldred slammed the ball into left field, the ball bouncing into the bleachers, scoring a runner ahead of him, in the 11th frame.

Altogether the little center fielder had a large day yesterday with the willow, collecting a brace of singles, a double, a triple and a circuit crash. He was passed once intentionally, and scored four runs.

A duet of Oaks dished up the other chief thrills of the matinee. Billy Lane, Oak leftfielder, dashed back into left field and took Bill Kenworthy's drive out of the air with one mitt, cutting off a run in the sixth. With the score 6 to 5 with Seattle leading in the ninth Dennis Willie, Oak pinchhitter drove the ball into the right field bleachers for the circuit. Those two stunts were worth the price of admission.

It was a wild ball game from the first song until Eldred's homer hepped into the bleachers. Oakland started off strong and had piled up a four-run lead on Woodward. Seattle's new hurler in the first three and a half innings by cracking the ball in the pinches. Woodward didn't show a thing in the pitching line and was about as effective as a can of horse manure would be in putting out a fire. He tossed the ball over the grandstand when he was yanked from the mound and it cost him a \$50 fine and a 10-day suspension. It was small town stuff. His days as a Siwash seem to be numbered.

Al Demaree finished the game and did a pretty good job of it, getting credit for the victory. SEATTLE TAKES LEAD Seattle plugged away at the offerings of Krause, the veteran Oak southpaw, scoring a brace of runs in the third, another counter in the fourth and one in the sixth. Eldred tripled in the seventh and Kenworthy doubled, knotting the count. Carl Zamlock hopped a drive over second base for one base and the graceful Mr. Kenworthy counted which put Seattle in the lead 4 to 3.

With that blow Krause beat a retreat for the duzout and Kremer mounted the knoll. He stopped further scoring until the fatal 11th. Dennis Willie was sent in to pinch hit for Demoree in the ninth and he tied up the score with a drive against the right field wall which fell inside of the bleachers for a circuit count. HOW MARKERS WERE MADE Demaree held the enemy safe the rest of the way while Seattle counted two in the 11th when Cunningham singled, and went to second on Bohne's sacrifice and moved to third on Murphy's infield out. Then the eminent slugger, Mr. "Brick" Eldred stepped to the log and pounded the little round onion far into left field for a round trip, producing the blow that pulled us out of the cellar for the first time in many weary weeks.

A loss for Seattle today and a win for Sacramento over the Seals will put us back in the basement. It's up to the home boys to flail us to victory again if we want to keep clear of the bottom.

Either Holling or Arlett can be expected to mount the hill for the victory today while Bob Geary is the most likely candidate for mound duty for the home club.

The tribe is hitting the ball in the pinches. If the gang would only perk up their work in the field we'd start winning regularly. The defense of the locals has been their big weakness all year.

Sammy Bohne put up a sterling game yesterday, cracking out three hard singles and running the bases like a Ty Cobb. He stopped Lane's hard drive down the third base line with his glove hand in the fifth and tossed out the bases with a slider of position when he made the play, but he caught his man. If Seattle had about ten men like Sammy Bohne we'd be leading the league in a walk.

Brubaker, the new Oak shortstop, is a very sweet ball player. He is fast in the field and takes a pretty cut at the ball.

After starting out the game like a winner by making a wild throw to first and dropping a pitched ball which counted in Oakland's scoring, Bradwin came to life and played some real baseball behind the plate the rest of the way yesterday. He stung the ball for three satisfactory hits during the fray.

Everybody squawks when Al Demaree starts pegging the ball to first with runners on the initial bag, but he caught Cooper, one of the fastest men in the league, flat-footed off of first in the ninth.

Herman and Anderson Box Draw

CHICAGO MILLER FLOORS TACOMAN SPEIRS IS STILL IN RACE FOR GOLF TITLE

Andre Anderson, the Chicago heavyweight mauler, and Tiny Herman, the Tacoma boy, fought four rounds to an even verdict at Liberty park last night. There wasn't much excitement to the battle except in the second round when Herman started to get rough. The Tacoma gladiator took Anderson by the waist and heaved him across the ring. Anderson got real peevish and went after Herman in real cave-man style, altho he didn't do much damage.

After exchanging a few wild wallops Andre Herman had hurtled Anderson across the ring, the Chicago miller caught Herman flush on the chin with a right from his hips as Herman was going into a clinch and Herman was on the floor when the bell rang, the gong probably saving him the fight.

The big fellows moved around fairly fast in the opening round, with Herman doing most of the leading with his left, while Anderson was content to wait for Herman to lead, using a stiff right cross as Herman came in. The round was even.

Anderson won the second round by virtue of his knockdown. HERMAN TAKES THIRD ROUND The third round went to Herman. The Tacoma miller came back after hitting the floor in the previous round and demonstrated that he knew how to use his left mitt.

The boys slowed down a bit in the final session, with neither having much of an advantage. Referee Schacht's draw decision was O. K. with the customers.

Herman was the faster of the two millers last night and was in fine shape, the extra beef he used to carry having been trained down. Anderson, however, landed the cleaner blows and his knockdown gave him a bit the shade in the fight.

Jimmy Storey, local welterweight, didn't hurt his game any by laying off for awhile because he made short work of Dixie Walker, the Yakima kid. Just as we predicted Walker forgot to keep his chin protected and in the first round Storey slapped home his famous one-two punch and Walker hit the floor in a heap.

He got up but Storey rained more blows on the Yakima boy so fast that Schacht gave the fight to Storey after a minute of milling. Storey will meet Travis Davis, Coast champion, at the Arena Wednesday.

Eddie Moore, the little newsboy miller, was given a setback by Ludwig Jones, Tacoma brawler. Jones outboxed Moore all the way, and his defense was too strong for the Seattle boy, who couldn't land his famous haymaker. Jones won the referee's verdict without a doubt.

WOODS SHOULD HAVE HAD DRAW The Zuzu Kid had a doubtful call over Soldier Woods. It was a wild battle all the way, but honors seemed pretty even. The Soldier forced all the fighting and had the kid reeling at one stage of the bout. It was a good battle for the boys who like a slam-bang affair.

Joe Dunn and Bud Oliver fought a slugfest draw in the opener. They're welterweights. WILDE AND PETE HERMAN TO MIX Pete Herman, bantamweight champ, and Jimmy Wilde, the flyweight champion of England, are slated to meet in London, September 1, for a purse of \$20,000.

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WITH THE RINGSIDER

Benny Leonard, world's lightweight king, has hurled a challenge at Lew Tendler, the Philly southpaw, offering the Quaker City boy \$7,500 for his work, but Leonard forgets to mention the weight question. Tendler refuses to fight Leonard unless the champion weighs in at 135 pounds ringside. Tendler says that he is a legitimate lightweight himself and he doesn't intend to fight any waterweights, title or no title, and he's entirely in the right.

Tendler boxes Willie Jackson, the hard-hitting New York lightweight, 10 rounds at Philadelphia Monday. This pair is expected to put up one of the best scraps ever staged in the Pennsylvania metropolis.

The next big international mitt match will be the Pete Herman-Jimmy Wilde battle in London September 1, for a purse of \$20,000. Herman is the holder of the world's bantamweight championship, while Wilde is the flyweight king of the roped arena.

M. Deschanel, president of France, has accepted the honorary presidency of the French Boxing Federation. This means that the French republic has given its approval of the boxing game, and puts the ring sport on the same footing that it enjoys in England, where the Prince of Wales showed his approval of the game by attending the recent show of the National Sporting club of London, when Jimmy Wilde boxed there.

Two new European ring champions have been crowned recently. Charley Ledoux, French bantamweight, stopping Jim Higgins, English star, in 11 rounds, and Arthur Wynn, Belgian ring star, knocking out Mike Honeyman, also of England, in 10 rounds. Ledoux is now in New York City.

Bill Brennan, the Chicago heavyweight, will be the first opponent of Jack Dempsey, king of sweat, according to flistic talk from the Windy City. Brennan has been getting pretty good in the East, winning most of his fights by the K. O. method. He stopped Ole Anderson, former Tacoma heavyweight, recently. Brennan fought Dempsey a couple of years ago, and took the big count in a couple of rounds.

Bob Martin's chance for fame in the ring game were given a big knock when he was given a licking by Bob Roper, the Chicago miller, recently. Martin is still young, however, and is a big, strong kid, but he evidently has a lot to learn before he is a championship contender.

Benny Valgar, the French flash, and one of the leading contenders for Johnny Kilbane's featherweight title, is recovering from an operation in the East. He won't be ready to box for several months.

HAGEN WINS IN FRENCH MEET PARIS, July 2.—Walter Hagen, the American professional golf star, defeated Lafitte, the French star, in the French open golf championship here yesterday. The score at the end of the second day's play was 298 up and Hagen yesterday made two rounds with the score of 150 while the Frenchman made it in 154.

Jeff Jones, Harvard university first sacker last year, has signed to play with "Connie Mack's Athletics. He will report immediately.

BALLARD BEAVERS TO MAKE BIG BID FOR CUP

When it comes to passing out the trophy to the winner of The Star Junior diamond league next month, the Ballard Beavers promise to have a lot to say about where the cup will be permanently located. The Beavers have won four straight games in their section in The Star circuit and they're out for their fifth win Sunday when they tangle with the Greenwood Cubs at Adams field. If they defeat the Cubs they will be tied with the Mt. Baker boys, July 18, at Columbia field.

The Ballard outfit has lined up a brace of real twirlers in Bij Middelendorf, a southpaw, and "Fat" Bergh, a righthander. Middelendorf has plenty of speed and a good curve ball. He also throws a splitter. Bergh has a good fast ball and does on control.

The Beavers lose the services of "Beaver" Walby this week. The hard-hitting outfielder is on his way to Alaska where he will work for the summer.

GOOD COLLECTION OF HITTERS The Beavers have a good collection of hitters. Harvey Johnson, their chief mack man; Eddie Torngerson, second sacker, and Bill Middelendorf, hurler, are the leading sticklers. All of this trio bat from the left side of the plate. Les McLennan, center field, and his brother Rod, the third sacker, also hit fairly well.

George Fraley, former Ballard high school tomer, is expected to replace Walby in the field.

Their defense is pretty good with R. McLennan and Bob Dahl working well on the left side of the diamond. Dahl is one of the best junior shortstops in the city. The fielding of the flycatchers is also pretty tight. Johnson, the regular catcher is a heavy receiver and a good thrower, but he has a habit of dropping too many pitched balls. He'll have to perk up on this department of his play.

Mt. Baker park, tied with the Beavers for the leadership in their section, have finished their regular schedule with the exception of their struggle with the Beavers. They are

counting on the box work of Speedy to bring them the title in their section. MADISSON VS. FELIX CLUB The big game on Sunday's schedule will be the Madison park-Felix club mix at Walla Walla.
