Society Woman Says Elwell Feared Death

NEW YORK, June 9.—State attorneys investigating the murder of Joseph B. Elwell, slain gambler in women's hearts and horses, have corroborated the theory that the former whist expert was in deadly fear of his life thru the testimony of Mrs. Josephine Lewis Peet Wilmerding, social leader, and one of Elwell's numerous friends.
 Mrs. Wilmerding, who is a divorcee, admitted frankly that she had "played around" considerably with Elwell in 1918, both in New York and at Palm Beach, but that the association had been purely one of friendship. She declared he expressed fear because of his activities against alien enemies during the war.
 SAYS SHE KNEW THE "PINK KIMONO GIRL."
 Mrs. Wilmerding declared that she knew "Miss Wilson" the "pink kimono" girl, whose clothing was found in Elwell's house on the morning of the murder, but did not know of the degree of familiarity which existed between the two. Mrs. Wilmerding denied that she was the woman over whom "Miss Wilson" is said to have grown violently jealous.
 Mrs. Wilmerding declared she went to a hospital for an operation several months before the murder and that Elwell called once to see her. She said that Elwell asked her to write to him, but that she never did. That visit was the last time she had ever seen him.
 "He was a good sport and an interesting companion," Mrs. Wilmerding declared, "but that is all I know about him. I know nothing of his personal life or the events leading up to the killing."

ELWELL PROBE FLAT FAILURE
 Collapse of New "Lead" Ends All Clues

HERE TO HELP FIX COAL WAGE



James H. Allport

James H. Allport, Pennsylvania mining engineer, who is sitting as an appointee of President Wilson on a board of Washington coal miners and operators meeting in Seattle in an attempt to mediate a difference in the existing wage scale.

Thru his services as a member of the engineers' committee of the United States fuel administration, Allport is well-known in the coal industry by both miners and operators. He also served on a presidential commission in France during the latter part of the war.

Besides Mr. Allport, the commission consists of Robert H. Harlin, president, and Ernest Newsham, secretary, of District No. 19, United Mine Workers of America, and D. F. Buckingham, manager of the Roslyn Fuel company, and N. D. Moore, vice president of the Pacific Coast Coal company.

The commission, which is to investigate and report to a joint conference of miners and operators of this state as to the effect of the application of the national coal commission's award to the operators of this state, is holding its hearing at the offices of the Washington Coal Operators' association, at 603 Lyon building.

The present investigation of the situation in this state is the outgrowth of the wage controversy which resulted in the nation-wide strike of last November. The national commission investigated the national question, including this state, but in its award, made last March, excepted Washington from the national award, providing instead for a further local investigation which, thru the presidential appointment of Mr. Allport, is now on.

SHOE SALESMAN BIT TOO MOIST

So Federal Officers Declare; He's Arrested

Walter E. Brown, shoe salesman of Seattle, was arrested by customs agents as he stepped off the Great Northern owl train from Vancouver Friday morning, and is being held on liquor smuggling charges. Federal agents claim to have found six quarts of gin and eight quarts of Canadian whisky in his possession.

Brown was arrested this spring transporting seven ounces of morphine in his new Page car. For this he was given 10 days in jail and fined \$500. He admitted at that time that he had brought the morphine in from Canada, but secured leniency on the plea of it being his first offense and the fact that he has a wife and several children living in Seattle. His car also was seized by the government.

This time customs agents suspected Brown of bringing in more narcotics, but upon arresting him they found the whisky instead.

Customs officials said that Brown's case would probably be turned over to the federal prohibition officers for prosecution.




