## MAN-HUNT IS ENLIVENED BY MAZE OF THRILLS

### ACCUSED FUGITIVE LUCKY IN ESCAPES

#### Decoys, Pursuits, Flights, Planes, Bloodhounds Follow Girl Killing

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Dec. 10.—Here's a real detective story. It's still happening, and nobody knows how it's going to end, or whether the villain is really the villain, or anything; but it's got a soldier-horse-doctor hero, and a man-hunt with bloodhounds and airplanes, and more thrills than a Bill Hart movie. It's like this, so far: the there may be a new chapter before you have finished reading:

**SOCIETY GIRL WAS SHOT WHILE MOTORING**  
Florence Barton, Kansas City society girl, and Howard Winter, her fiancé, driving near Hillcrest Country club on the night of October 2, were shot by one of three men in another automobile. Winter was slightly wounded. Miss Barton died on the way to a hospital.

Private detectives and the city force were put on the job of finding the murderer. After a month's chase thru Arizona and California, Denzel Chester, 27, blacksmith, was arrested in Great Falls, Mont., when he was lured to a rooming house by letters signed with the name of a woman whose love letters had been found among his belongings.

On the train, Chester was put in a stateroom. E. E. Beasley, police detective, sat in the room with him. Outside sat two detectives from a private agency. Beasley afterward said Chester's handcuffs had been removed to let him eat lunch and shave, and because he was treating him well to get him to answer questions.

**PRISONER JUMPS THRU TRAIN WINDOW**  
Suddenly, as the train pulled out of Broken Bow, Neb., there was a crash of glass, a volley of shots, and Beasley dashed out of the stateroom, shouting: "My God! Dennis! Jumped out of the window!"

The train was stopped, but of Chester, who was supposed to have dived thru two heavy panes of plate glass, there was no trace save a hat with a bullet hole in it.

Followed then a man-hunt that the whole Middle West will always remember. It was freezing weather and Chester was hatless and coatless. Bloodhounds were put on the trail. Officers took trains in all directions. Miss Barton's two brothers and Winter scoured the country in automobiles. John Hagan, superintendent of the detective agency, hovered over the region in an airplane.

**BIG REWARDS ARE OFFERED FOR HIM**  
Rewards totaling \$10,700 had been offered. But the prairie seemed to have opened and swallowed, Dennis Chester.

Almost exhausted, Barton, Hagan and a deputy sheriff named Hammond got a fresh tip, Nov. 13, that Chester was near Oconto, Neb. It was 3 o'clock in the morning, but only they went again. And just then arrived the hero, Dr. Martin Hanson, over six feet tall, 34 years old, a first lieutenant in the veterinary corps during the war. He had been treating a sick horse all night, and he volunteered to help in the search.

About noon, Hanson and Hammond, driving together, met a man in khaki uniform, "How far to Oconto?" asked Hanson, jumping out.

"Oh, five or six miles," replied the man.

Hanson's revolver was already against his stomach. "Hands up," he ordered, and they went up. It was Denzel Chester.

**TRIES TO HANG HIMSELF IN JAIL**  
In the Broken Bow jail, late that afternoon, Chester tore strips from his blanket, knotted them about his throat, and had almost strangled himself before he was found. Early next morning, despite the guard watching him, he suddenly stood up on his cot and dived headlong to the cement floor.

### 40,000,000 WILL FACE DEATH IN FAMINE

SHANGHAI.—(By Mail).—Famine relief work must continue for at least 10 months in China, according to estimates made by officials who have undertaken the distribution of the millions that are being subscribed to save the starving people. Forty million lives are imperiled by the famine.

The American Red Cross is taking

an active part in the relief work. Major Emmett C. White, chief of the insular and foreign division of the American Red Cross, has gone from Manila to work with American Minister Charles R. Crane in the administration of the project.

Appalling tales of misery are received daily from the eight Northern provinces affected by the famine, which is the result of a drought. People

have been eating leaves and grass, heads of families have poisoned their wives and children to save them from starvation, children have been sold into slavery that their parents might live and that they themselves would be cared for—these and other similar stories of horror have become so commonplace that they no longer cause a flurry of excitement here.

The rains have come to the parched provinces and the sufferers should be in a very much better position at the end of 10 months.

**MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 10.**—Owing to the increased cost of commodities Justice Clarke of the arbitration court has granted bonuses to 20,000 commonwealth public servants instead of permanent wage increases.


