

# WOMAN IS ROBBED BY 2 HOLD-UPS

## Halted on Street, 75 Cents Taken; Two Car Tokens Are Returned

Hold-up men robbed three persons Friday night. Two men robbed Mrs. George D. Flock, 4121 Maynard ave., 75 cents, and returned two street tokens to her, explaining that they would not be able to use them before they became void Saturday night.

Two Filipino backed S. Imakura, Niagara hotel, seventh ave. S. and King st., into a room of the hotel and robbed him of \$4.

# SCHOOL CLINIC TO BE DROPPED

## Board, However, to Urge Law Making It Legal

Discussion of the consequences of the recent decision of the supreme court ruling against the legality of school clinics and the election of new officers formed the principal business of the school board Friday afternoon.

E. Shorrock, a member of the board for 18 years, was elected president to succeed Judge Richard Winsor, defeated at the last election. H. E. King was elected vice president.

Richard W. Jones was re-elected secretary for the 19th time.

The board indicated its intention of seeking legislative action which will permit of the carrying on of the work of clinics in the schools.

No attempt will be made at the present time to continue the operation of the clinic at the Central school.

# U. S. May Deport Valera Secretary

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8.—Harry Boland, secretary to Ramon De Valera, "president of the Irish republic," is subject to deportation from the United States, it was learned today, for remarks attributed to him favoring attacks against British subjects and British institutions in this country.

The department is inquiring into Boland's alleged statements and into his status as an alien.

Boland, it is said here, came to the United States as a stoker and did not carry a passport.

**No Market Yet for Skagit Power Bonds**  
With only sufficient money available to carry on work on the Skagit power project for five weeks, the council finance committee is taking steps to provide funds from other sources with which to proceed with construction. No market has yet been found for the \$2,000,000 city light extension and Skagit bonds, but it is believed that a market for the issue will develop early in the spring.

The hope was expressed by the distinguished visitors, that the friendly relations between the two countries would be further cemented by groups of business men of both nations visiting both countries.



# FIVE COUNTIES 'OVER THE TOP'

## Raise Quotas for Europe's Hungry Children

Five counties in the state have gone "over the top" in the campaign to raise \$25,000,000 in this country for the starving children of Europe, according to a dispatch received this morning from I. H. Burnett, state chairman of the European relief council, at his Tacoma office.

Cowlitz county reported 117 per cent of its quota raised and Ferry county 112 per cent. Early in the campaign Walla Walla, Benton and Pend Oreille counties announced that they had met their obligations in full.

The total raised in the state is \$148,000. The state's quota is \$350,000, which leaves more than \$200,000 yet to be subscribed, but Burnett expressed confidence that this amount will be obtained if Seattle and King county give the \$150,000 for which they have been asked.

Following a meeting of the King county relief organization, it was announced today that Seattle had contributed a little more than a third of the sum.

Active solicitation will not be resumed, but contributions will be received until the fund is complete. Checks should be sent to M. F. Backus, treasurer of the county organization and president of the National Bank of Commerce.

# CAR CO. MUST REFUND FARES

## City Wins Fight Against Rainier Valley Line

Seattle policemen and firemen will be refunded all fares that they have paid during the past several months to the Seattle and Rainier Valley railway, as the result of a decision handed down by the supreme court of Washington.

Under the decision, the railway company must carry out its franchise obligations and carry the cops and firemen free of charge when on official duty. At the time the police and firemen were denied free transportation, they were advised by the legal department of the city to obtain individual receipts whenever they paid their fares.

These receipts must now be cashed by the company. It is possible that the Rainier Valley railway will refund the receipts until the remittor of the higher court is sent here, a matter of not more than 20 days.

Assistant Corporation Counsel Thomas J. L. Kennedy appeared in behalf of the city.

# GIRL SHRIEKS AT GANGSTER TRIAL

## 'Can't Ruin My Character!' Cries Miss Stanley

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 8.—The defense of Allen McDonnell, charged with assaulting Jessie Montgomery in connection with the so-called Howard st. gang cases, was expected to open today. The prosecution practically closed its case at a dramatic session last night. After Jessie Montgomery had told her story and then hurried from the court room in a fit of hysterics, Jean Stanley, her cousin, took the stand to give corroborative evidence.

In the midst of Miss Stanley's cross-examination, McDonnell's attorney asked a comparative unimportant question, but one designed to lay a foundation for an attack on Miss Stanley's character.

"You can't ruin my character," cried Miss Stanley. She leaped from her chair, lodged behind Judge Ward's desk and fled, crying, into the judge's chambers, where Mrs. Katherine O'Connor, policewoman, comforted her. Later she returned to the stand and answered perfunctory questions.

The charges in the case of McDonnell, which covers two indictments, are the most revolting yet brought out in the so-called gang prosecutions.
