SARDINE TOAST 1 box sardines 2 hard-boiled eggs 1/2 cup rice 2 canned pimientos 1/2 cup grated cheese Remove skin and bones from sardines. Mash with yolks of eggs, using oil from sardines to make moist and smooth. Boil rice until tender. Drain and put in hot buttered pan and shake over fire to puff kernels. Chop pimientos and whites of eggs and mix with rice. Season with salt and pepper. Spread the sardine mixture on triangles of hot buttered toast, add a layer of rice mixture and cover with grated cheese. Put in a very hot oven or under the flame to melt the cheese. Serve at once.

None of this season's fashion whims has been played up with more success than the apron effect, which is shown in the attractive dress pictured above. It is cinder gray, with a long waisted bodice, having long sleeves cut in one, attached to a plain skirt. From this in front is dropped an apron tunic of the same cloth, all-over embroidered in dull reds and blues, with much black and dark gray.

The tunic is attached to a narrow belt that buttons at either side. The sleeves are slashed to the elbows on the outside, the edges faced and then caught, once with a button on the way down to a tight half-inch wristband.

On either side, just above the belt, is a tiny rectangular pocket of the embroidery that is the only hint of decoration on the bodice.

SPANISH RICE

1 cup rice 1 quart canned tomatoes 2 medium sized onions 2 green peppers 1/2 cup diced celery 1 1/2 teaspoon salt 3/4 teaspoon pepper 2 tablespoons bacon fat Melt bacon fat in a frying pan and add sliced onions. Cook until onions are a pale straw color. Add tomatoes. Add rice carefully washed and drained. Add celery and shredded peppers. Season with salt and pepper and cook slowly for an hour. Stir frequently to prevent burning.

GLACE APPLES

3 apples 1 cup sugar Pare and core apples. Cut in slices about half an inch thick. Put in a stew pan with the sugar and cook very slowly for 45 minutes. Apples that are rather coarse-grained and don't cook to pieces are the nicest to use. The syrup should be a very pale straw color when removed from the fire. Do not try to cook more than this quantity at one time.
