


SIWASH PITCHING STAFF IS COMPLETE

Gardner turned in some sweet pitching throughout most of the 1920 season and the veteran should be good for a lot of wins again this year. And then Geary and Demaree, who were new to the league last season, will have the advantage in knowing the batters this summer, and that is one of the biggest necessities of a pitcher in any league.

Demaree went GREAT ON ROAD. During the closing days of the season both Geary and Demaree pitched remarkable ball, especially Demaree, who was practically unbeatable on the last road trip taken by the locals. 
Let George Do It!

Rath came to Seattle from the Cincy Reds after being waived out of the team. Rath led the national league karpis men in fielding and batted .367 in 1920.

Dixie Carroll, the best-footed Southern league youngster, who hit around .349 for Memphis, and led the Southern league in stolen bases, has been turned over to the Los Angeles club in the deal that sent Bill Werhahn to the St. Louis Cardinals. Carroll was sent to the Cards by the Memphis club at the close of the 1920 season. Eddie Bengert, who has panned on the Coast before, also goes to the Angels in the same deal. Eddie played 11 star games in the Western league last season.

Chief Bender will train his New Haven Eastern league champions at Naum, Pa., this spring. And it's a Class A league.

Earl Shely, first sacker, didn't miss a game with the Salt Lake team last year. He pitched in 148 games.

RICKARD SAYS BIG BOUT IS ON

NEW YORK, Jan. 19.—"The Dempsey-Carpenter match will be held July 2, probably either in Canada or England," G. L. Tex Rickard, one of the promoters, told the United Press today.

Rickard thus disposed of rumors circulated earlier in the day that the bout between Jack Dempsey and Georges Carpentier for the heavyweight boxing championship of the world had been canceled.

"Every cent of money called for in the articles has been posted in surety bonds in New York city," Rickard said. "This includes the \$100,000 of Dempsey and Carpentier and a like amount put up by William A. Brady, Charles B. Cochrane and myself.

"The action of the state boxing commission in putting a limit on prizes for boxing contests apparently precludes the possibility of holding the match in New York city, as originally planned. But we have received several good offers both from Canada and England, and the bout is certain to be held in one of those countries on Saturday afternoon, July 2.

"Just at present the best offer we have received is from Toronto. You will probably hear all sorts of rumors about the contest being called off, but don't believe any of them."

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 19.—Jack Kearns today added his denial to that of Tex Rickard, to New York reports that the Dempsey-Carpenter match for the world's heavyweight championship was off. Kearns declared that Dempsey's forfeit money has been on deposit in New York for many days and that he knows definitely that Carpentier's money also has been posted. The New York report was to the effect that the principals had failed to put up their money.

Cincinnati won Seattle three players in the Brenton-Hohne deal, Morris Rath, infielder, and Swartz, pitcher, having been turned over to the tribe already.

Those three players may be Ray Fisher, pitcher, Nick Allen, catcher, and Dode Paskert, outfielder.

Waivers have been asked on the former pair, according to reports from the East. Paskert, one of the real veterans of the National league, has been turned over to the Cincy club by the Chicago Nationals via the waiver route. Paskert has outlived his big league usefulness, but he is said to still have a lot of good baseball left in him.

Paskert started out his big league career with the Philly Nationals and after many years of service on Quaker teams he joined the Chicago Cubs, where he has been located for the past few seasons. He was of little use to the Cubs last year because they had younger men on the job.

Fisher is another veteran. He's a spitballer. He started with the New York Yanks and joined the Reds about three or four years ago. Allen is of unknown quantity.

Chances are if Fisher or Allen come to Seattle they will be traded to other Coast league outfits because Seattle already has a wealth of pitchers and catchers. Paskert may fit into the outfield in O. K. fashion.

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BASEBALL ON SKATES! IT'S LAST WORD IN SPORT

BY DEAN SNYDER. CLEVELAND, Jan. 19.—Baseball on skates! They're playing it on the ice here again this winter.

"It's a fast game. There's nothing like it." That's the Dode Paskert's impression of the ice sport. Dode is one of the National league's vet outfielders. He belongs to Cincinnati.

"A fellow has to think quicker on skates than on spikes," he says. "It's surprising how few errors players make, too. Infield boundaries are a cinch. Chasing the high ones in the outfield causes most of the trouble."

"When you start after a fly ball, it's hard to camp under. You can't turn and go back, either." Other diamond stars are playing the skate baseball, too. Bill Wamburgana, world series hero of the Indians, is a member of one of the league's teams.

Jack Craney, another Indian, has his skates sharpened up and is waiting for thicker ice. There is a six-team organization here. It's called the Cleveland Ice Baseball league. Chicago is experimenting with the ice sport, too.

It's hoped to hold a world series before the ice melts. Ross Tenney, president of the league, is the father of ice baseball. He tried it out two years ago. The rules are a combination of the indoor and outdoor codes. Dangers that at first made it impracticable for star players to risk injury playing it have been reduced to a minimum.

The game attracts both skating and diamond stars. The skaters have it on the ball players, tho. Other players on the team roster are: Pete Johns, former St. Louis Brown; Louis Crowley and Bill Kirschnick, members of the sandlot champions; Johnny Hoernig, who once held the national championship for skating backward; Elmer Irving and Omar DeChon, both star hockey players of the National Hockey league; "No Hit" Bowers, indoor baseball pitcher of Cleveland, who holds a record for pitching no-hit games.

So far all games have been played on park rinks in the open. Waiting for freeze-ups has been the chief obstacle. But it is an exciting game to watch. Some day it's going to rival hockey.
