Michele De Caro Wins Applause A program of unusual musical worth was given Saturday evening in Meany Hall by the Seattle Symphony Orchestra and Michele De Caro, soloist.

Mr. De Caro has a baritone voice of good quality, and ample range. He sings with marked feeling and personal individuality. His first number, Prologue from "Pagliacci," with the orchestra, met with such prolonged applause that he repeated the last half. In the group of songs which followed, "Tosti's 'Titi Cansone'" and "Cecchi di Pavia" by Denza were well received. Another favorite was "Requiescat," by Harold Henry, who appeared with the Symphony the early part of the season. Mrs. Frederick Bentley was Mr. De Caro's accompanist.

For the opening number the orchestra gave Triumphant March from "Aida," by Verdi. This was followed by Overture to "Martha," by Ippolitov-Ivanov. CAUCASIAN Sketches, consisting of four parts, all of a decided Oriental strain, came next. For the closing numbers they gave Andante from Symphony No. 1 by Sibelius, which was given a very delightful rendition, as was Moskowski's Malagena from "Boadilla," the finale.



ORANGE PUDDING

3 oranges 1 cup sugar 2 eggs 1 tablespoon cornstarch 2 tablespoons sugar 1/2 teaspoon salt 2 cups milk 2 tablespoons powdered sugar 3 tablespoons powdered sugar Peel oranges, carefully removing all the white possible. Cut in thin slices and remove seeds. Put in a pudding dish and sprinkle over the top with the powdered sugar. Beat the whites of the eggs till stiff and dry with the powdered sugar and two tablespoons of sugar and salt. Heat milk in double boiler. When hot add the egg mixture.
