

# SCHOOLGIRL JURY FREES EINAR AHO

### Judge Finds Them Sitting in Jury Box and Puts Them to Work

Seven school girls and one man's liberty—this is the tale as it happened. Justice of the Peace C. G. Dalton sat in his courtroom, perplexed. He had just heard the testimony in the case of Einar Aho, charged with grafting.

He had questioned Charlie Woo, Chinese, who had explained how Aho had entered Woo's hotel, 470 Weller st., and mulcted him of \$10 by displaying a deputy sheriff's badge.

He had tried to get Patrolman C. E. Dobson to make it clear why Aho had only \$4.50 and no badge in his possession when he was arrested by Dobson after he and Woo had tracked him to Masafumi Matsui's cider house, where Aho, according to the testimony, had spent 50 cents.

He had questioned Aho concerning the nature of the hotel where Woo hung forth, and Aho, in scarcely understandable English, had said something that suggested a game of chance. At least, the judge so interpreted it.

"I take this case under advisement," he announced. Then, looking up at the crowded courtroom where intense interest seemed to prevail, he asked: "Who are all these people?"

A young woman, confident and smiling, announced that her class in civil government at the Lowell grammar school was visiting the court.

"And who are these in the jury box?"

"Seven of my girls," was the answer. "Young women," said Dalton, turning to the jury box, "I appreciate your interest. You will some day be called upon to perform jury duty. You have listened carefully to the last case. Deliberate on it and tell me what to do."

The girls conferred. Then each wrote out her ballot and passed it to Dalton. All said "Not guilty."

"On what do you base your verdict?" asked the judge.

"Insufficient evidence," they chorused.

"The jury's verdict is accepted," Dalton announced.

"Bring back that man," he shouted to the departing deputies. "Aho, you are free."
