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Permanent Program for Regulation of Immigration Planned

WASHINGTON, Feb. 4.—Congress will not at this session set up any emergency barriers against immigration. Instead, early in the next administration an attempt will be made to revise our immigration policy so as to give the United States the cream of immigrants by making possible: FIRST—Better regulation of immigration at its source. SECOND—A closer check on the physical and mental fitness of immigrants. THIRD—A system of distribution that will put the greatest possible percentage of newcomers in agricultural communities. The Johnson bill, rushed thru the house in an attempt to forestall a deluge of immigration, will not be reported out by the immigration committee of the senate.

SENATE SHOWS NO SIGNS OF ACTION If any measure is reported by the committee for action at this session, it will be the Dillingham bill, which would limit immigration from any country in any one year to 5 percent of the number of persons of such nationality already residing in the United States. But even if the Dillingham bill is reported, there is no expectation the senate will undertake to put it thru at this session. Testimony before the senate committee has been to the effect that the Johnson bill, providing for the temporary suspension of immigration, would not reduce the present immigration by one man.

SAYS LEGISLATION CAN'T BE RUSHED Frederick A. Wallis, commissioner of immigration at New York, says the fact that millions of persons in Europe are anxious to emigrate to this country is no excuse for rushing thru ill-considered restrictive legislation.

IMMIGRATION BOARD FOR REGULATION That skimming is provided for in a measure drawn by Senator Sterling of the senate committee, which he will press for action at the next session. Sterling's bill would create an immigration board with full powers to regulate immigration according to the industrial or employment situation at any given time, and according to the aims and abilities of the would-be immigrant.

PLACING IMMIGRANTS ON ARRIVAL But fully as important would be the board's powers in placing immigrants on arrival. Full information would be secured from each state as to its current employment and labor opportunities. This would be distributed at all embarkation ports to persons leaving for this country, and also at all immigrant stations in the United States.

Says Speech Should Be Long as a Skirt LONDON, Eng., Feb. 4.—"Speech on a social occasion ought to be like ladies' skirts—long enough to cover the subject and short enough to be interesting," said J. Weil, president of Norbury London County Council Tenant Association, speaking at a social gathering.


