TOM MEIGHAN in any kind of a picture is a welcome visitor; but Tom Meighan as a two-fisted East Side gang leader in a red-blooded picture like "The Frontier of the Stars," at the Strand this week, is a real screen treat.

Mr. Meighan is cast in the same kind of a major-crook role he had in "The Miracle Man." He plays "Buck Leslie," New York gunman. Chased to the roof of a tenement by a detective, he encounters there a pretty crippled girl, who has spent her whole life in a wheel-chair, and has never been on the streets. Her innocence and beautiful philosophy of life appeals to the hardened "Buck" and in the end she makes a man out of him.

A thrilling fire scene, in which Mr. Meighan rescues Faire Blaney, who plays the role of the girl, is one of the features of the picture. Miss Binney, sister of the well known Constance Binney, is charming to look upon, and the rest of the supporting company is of good calibre.

CLEMMER
Luther Reed's popular story "Cinderella's Twin," is being shown on the screen at the Clemmer this week with piquant little Viola Dana in the role of a scullery maid who goes straight into a twentieth-century mansion to find the heart of the man she loves.

"Cinderella's Twin" has many unusual situations. One of them is the incident where Connie McGill, the little maid, suddenly has to flee the splendor of a ballroom, and in the act drops her slipper, which contained the key to a safety vault holding jewels sought by thieves. Her Prince Charming gets the slipper, and arrested into the bargain for theft.

In the old story, a fairy godmother does the trick; in the modern version, a gang of unscrupulous thieves assist the little maid to see the brilliant life. It tells of Connie who is given to dreaming, and has for her hero a social light she saw photographed in a magazine. Her dreams come true, but only thru a band of thieves, who make her a tool and are later frustrated by her action.

Miss Kellerman, ruddy-checked, with perfect physique, graceful, versatile and with a friendly, gossip line of humor, was gone all too soon. Besides her swimming and diving, she appeared in high-class ballet dancing, preluded some tight-rope feats with tales of her experiences in the movies, and also sang a comic, clad as an English chappie.

Alton and Allen, dancers, and Walter Hastings, pianist and singer, added to the excellence of her act.

Flo and Ollie Walters, petite singers and comedians, nearly tied the show into a knot. The crowd would not let them go until they came and begged off.

Stuart Barnes, an old favorite, convulsed with songs and talk.

Other bright particular stars include Henry Hall and Fanchon Everhart, as father and mother of the girl; Mary Thorne, Margaret Armstrong, Howard Russell and Erman Seaver.
