Business and Professional Women's Club

The Seattle Business and Professional Women's club will have an open meeting in the assembly room of the Chamber of Commerce at 6:30 p. m., on Tuesday, February 8, at which meeting Dr. W. Christensen, president of the Port of Seattle commission, will address the club on "Ports of the United States I Have Visited," and Col. Matt H. Gormley, auditor of the Port of Seattle, will tell the club of "The Port of Seattle." As our port and commerce are the chief assets of our city, we desire that all members and their friends come to this meeting in order that they may learn more of our public port facilities.

At the meeting held on February 1, after a brief business program, Mr. C. W. Uhden, chief engineer of the Skagit River project, gave the club a most interesting and instructive illustrated lecture on "Skagit River Project." The lecture comprised such subjects as the geographical location of the project and the beautiful surrounding scenery; the railroad connections; descriptions of the dam sites and the operation of same; tabulated charts of the proposed improvements and of the total cost of investment in this project. He pointed out how the Ruby and Gorge sites were ideal dam sites and showed how this Skagit River project may be operated in conjunction with the Cedar River plant and the Steam plant.

Following Mr. Uhden's lecture, Mr. W. Jos. Shea of Montreal, Canada, told the club members of the international convention of American Association of Port Authorities at Seattle in August, 1921, and as assistant secretary of the association, thanked the club in behalf of the association for its telegram which they sent to the Chicago convention thru Dr. Christensen last fall.

On Saturday, January 29, the Seattle Business and Professional Women's club took its second industrial tour of "Know Your Own City" and were personally conducted thru the Puget Sound Light & Power plant by Mr. Santmyer. This was a real education to the women of the club and two of the outstanding facts they derived from the tour were that this plant is run on the by-products of a coal mine, which at one time had been dumped into the Sound and not utilized, and the fact that this plant on Western ave. furnished steam for the entire downtown district. These trips are of such an educational value that each member of the club considers it a privilege to attend same.
