

WITNESSES SOUGHT OF 1918 DEATH

Widow of Shipyard Worker Killed at Duthie's Seeks Belated Justice

OLYMPIA, Feb. 19.—Occasionally in the monotonous grind of legislative machinery at the state capitol a bill appears that carries with it the hope and the future of a little family.

Yesterday such a bill was introduced in the house—a bill to give justice to a widow and her two children.

And thru The Seattle Star the sponsors of the bill, Representatives Paul Houser and H. P. Rude, of King county, hope to find the two living witnesses who can establish the claim of the little family to compensation under the industrial insurance act.

R. T. Jones was a shipyard worker employed by J. F. Duthie & Co. On July 12, 1918, he was knocked from a staging on which he was working on the hull of a ship. He struck on his head and was assisted to his home by two fellow workers. A month later he died.

DAZED, HE FAILED TO GIVE WIFE FACTS

After Jones' accident he never left the house. He was in a daze and failed to tell his wife that she was entitled to compensation under the industrial insurance act. She did not learn that she could get a widow's pension until more than a year had elapsed. Then it was too late.

The men who had worked with her husband had disappeared with the end of war shipbuilding. The two workers who had assisted her husband home could not be found. They are the only witnesses to the accident. Without them she cannot obtain her pension.

NOW IN POOR CIRCUMSTANCES

And these are the men that The Star has been asked to find! Mrs. Jones is 60 years of age, living at 5014 49th ave. S. W. She has two little daughters. They are virtually without funds. They will lose their home if they cannot obtain what is really due them from the state.

The industrial insurance commission is anxious to help the little family, but under the statute it is prohibited from allowing Mrs. Jones a widow's pension, unless she can prove that her husband was killed while working at the shipyard.

Two men, fellow workers, are the only witnesses. They must be found! BILL INTRODUCED FOR HER RELIEF

In the meantime the bill introduced yesterday would grant the widow the rights she would have had if state had not played her false. The act appropriates \$500 from the state accident fund to Mrs. Jones and \$20 a month for herself and \$5 each for the kiddies.

But the bill may not pass—despite the influence of kind-hearted legislators. Then the only hope for the little family—now almost destitute—is that the men who carried the shipyard worker home that July day nearly three years ago may be found thru the efforts of The Star.

NEW SCHOOLS RECOMMENDED

Cooper Asks That 3 Old Ones Be Discarded

Recommendation that the Columbia, Main St. and Dunlap school buildings be discarded and new ones constructed are contained in the report to the school board made Friday by Superintendent Frank B. Cooper.

Additional ones recommended to the McDonald, Gatewood, Ravenna, York, Youngstown, Jefferson, Alki, North Queen Anne and Harrison schools. Overcrowded buildings were reported as follows: The B. F. Day, Interlake, Pacific, Walla Walla, Washington, Whittier, Stevens, Lafayette and Bagley schools.

Recommendations were also made for the child study laboratory, special schools' center and school for the deaf.

4,000 More Men to Work in Ford Plant

DETROIT, Feb. 19.—Four thousand men will be added to the working force at the Ford Motor Co.'s Highland Park plant. It was announced today. This will bring the total working force to 1,400, and the average production to 2,500 cars a day.
