ACROSS THE RHINE



German Industries Booming, Despite Howls of "Can't Pay!"

LONDON, March 15.—The booming of German industry in the face of the booms of German cannon echoes in the ears of the allied troops taking positions on the Rhine to enforce reparations demands.

German industries are on the way to wonderful prosperity while the German government insists, "We are broke and cannot pay."

The government is broke, but German industry—which must support the government—is far from financially straitened.

Great private companies and trusts are making huge profits in German markets, but the government shows balances all on the wrong side of the budget.

French critics say this is because the state machine maintains on the payroll an army of needless functionaries, and that pay for employees of the railways, posts and telegraph has been recklessly raised.

At the end of last October Germany's floating and funded debt was 288,000,000,000 marks, of which only 91,000,000,000 marks was funded.

The total debt was estimated for January 1 as 318,000,000,000 marks.

These sums are exclusive of what Germany will have to pay Germans for deliveries of ships, agricultural machinery, horses and war material to the allies, estimated at 131,000,000,000 marks, also of reparations.

FRIGHTS WERE HUGE DEFICIT FOR YEAR

The government is faced with a deficit of 70,000,000,000 marks for the present financial year on current obligations in paying for the allied armies of occupation, commissions and requisitions, on running her own postal and railway administration, and on the governmental budget.

Talaat Pasha Is Slain by Student

BERLIN, March 15.—Talaat Pasha, war minister for Turkey during the great war, was assassinated here yesterday by an Armenian student.

The former Turkish minister was believed to have been murdered as a revenge for Armenian massacres, for which he was regarded largely responsible.

With the defeat of the central powers and their allies, Talaat Pasha was thrown out of office and fled to Germany. He established a home here.

Big Lumber Order Signed in Canada

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 15.—One of the largest orders for manufactured lumber ever secured in British Columbia was closed yesterday when the Canadian Overseas Trading company signed up to supply an Alexandria firm, which represents the government of Egypt, with 24,000,000 feet of railway ties.

The first 8,000,000 feet, comprising two shipments, will leave Vancouver in April aboard Canadian government steamers.

Germany has been rapidly recovering from the blow struck by the peace treaty, which took away from it many of its iron ore mines.

Germany is working more intensively the iron ore fields that still remain, is importing greater quantities of Swedish and Spanish ores, and is negotiating for purchases from French firms.

This has considerably changed the character of Germany's business. From being an exporter of semi-finished products like pig iron, blooms and billets, she now imports these.

Germany will work this iron up to the highest stage of manufacture possible. Great trusts are being formed for this purpose, one of them, the Rhine-Eibe union, having a capital of 500,000,000 marks and employing 200,000 men.

The blast furnaces and steel works of Germany are probably already producing 60 per cent of capacity.

The coal strike and high prices in England enabled German firms to get large orders for locomotives, rolling mills and electrical plants.

Dividends for the year 1919-20 invariably show an increase over 1918. Few figures have been printed anywhere on the status of the German dye industry.

As in other lines of business, the tendency has been to form huge combinations controlling tar, benzol, ammonia, nitrogen and other products. Over 400,000,000 worth of dyes were sold to England alone during 1920.

The great potash combine has shown improvement in 1920 compared to the preceding year.

This syndicate has been actively canvassing the American market and expects to make huge sales in the United States.

The textile industries of Germany have been troubled by the high cost of raw materials.

The first three-quarters of 1920 were very bad, but the latter part of 1921 showed a decided improvement.

One great disappointment was that just when the price of raw cotton fell in America, the rate of exchange dropped from 38 to 90 marks to the dollar, thus depriving the German factories of the chance to get cheaper raw material.

The last report by the German foreign trade department said cotton spinners and weavers were for the most part supplied with orders for the spring of 1921.

German artificial silk has been developed to such an extent that the mills now expect to be able to fulfill all home demands.

COAL AVAILABLE FAR BELOW NEEDS

In the same month Germany exported 2,423,973 tons, of which 1,300,000 tons went to the allies. This left 10,454,579 tons for Germany's use.

German requirements in August, 1919, were 13,000,000 tons, so that last August Germany had 22 per cent of her pre-war requirements.

In September Germany left for her own use 83 per cent of her pre-war requirements.

\$30,000,000 Pipe Line Is Planned

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 15.—A bill has been introduced in the Alberta legislature to allow Imperial Oil Limited, which is the Canadian subsidiary of the Standard Oil, to construct a 12-inch pipe line from the new oil field at Fort Norman to Edmonton.

It is estimated that the job will occupy two years and cost \$30,000,000.

Bride of Month Accused of Death

POPLAR BLUFF, Mo., March 15.—Mrs. Luthie Parsons, 15, and bride of one week, was held in the Farmington, Mo., jail today charged with the murder of her 6-year-old step-daughter.

Luthie is accused of shooting her little step-daughter near Iron Mountain last Friday.

John Parsons, Jr., 10, son of Luthie's husband by a former marriage, testified at the inquest that he saw his stepmother load a shotgun, following some trouble with his sister, and then shoot her.

The little girl was shot through the head and died instantly. Luthie, it is said, told the officers that she was only playing and did not know the gun was loaded.
