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## MRS. MAX WEST RECOMMENDS SLEEPING BAGS FOR BABIES

Breastfed babies for the best device so far discovered for keeping children covered at night and, after a mother has once learned the comfort of being able to go to bed and to sleep without worry about her child being uncovered, she will never go back to the old plan.

For winter, and climates where the nights are cold, the bag should be made of a wool blanket, the weight depending on the chilliness of the weather and the age of the child. Heavy army blankets may be used for well-grown children, but for babies a soft old blanket is best.

Use one-half of a small size double blanket. Fold it in the middle, cross-wise, and sew up one end and the other side. Across the open end sew several large snap fasteners, or buttons and loops, or even tapes to tie, leaving a soft old blanket is best.

The sleeping bag makes it impossible for the child to get himself uncovered, and at the same time gives him plenty of room to kick and turn his body as he pleases. In summer, the bag may be made of an old thin sheet, or a very light-weight blanket.

Q—How are paper pads for the baby's crib made? newspapers may be used. Have a cotton cover of the right size, usually torn from an old sheet, and they may be used for the pads, fastening the open edge with a few safety pins. Such a pad is, of course, to be discarded as soon as it has been wet once.

Q—Should I buy wool shirts and bands for a baby to be born in August? A—It is probably better to buy those that are part wool, and in a gauze weight. They may be either silk and wool or cotton and wool.

Q—I am a farmer's wife. Have two little boys. How can I keep them entertained and out of mischief while I am at work? A—Have a sand box made close to the kitchen door where you can look out frequently. Q—I have six children. Am trying to train them to be truthful, but find it hard. Will you suggest what I may do? A—Children naturally exaggerate. That is part of their education and training of the imagination. We
