## Music

### French Pianist to Be Heard April 20

The enthusiasm that has greeted Alfred Cortot, the distinguished French pianist, in the Eastern states on his present tour, will undoubtedly be equaled in Seattle, when he appears in concert April 20, at the First Methodist church, in the traditional event arranged by Sherman Clay & Co.

Cortot enjoys the reputation of being one of the greatest pianists of France as ever produced. His penetrating tone, fineness in shading dramatic force as a pianist give him a power of interpretation that delights all who hear him.

Throughout his present tour, Alfred Cortot has been assisted in his recitals by the Duo-Art piano. Of this instrument it has been said that it enables one to stretch a fleeting moment of divine beauty to eternity.

Cortot himself is very enthusiastic over this modern invention, and takes great delight in mystifying an audience with his two-piano recitals.

Among the numbers which Cortot will play are the "Andante Spagnolo" and "Polonaise" of Chopin, "Seguidilla" by Albiniz, "Etude en Forme de Valse" by Saint-Saens, "Etude in Flat" by Chopin, and "La Cathedrale Engloutie" (The Submerged Cathedral) by Debussy.

Two of his selections, the Chopin "Polonaise" and "Variations on Theme by Beethoven," by Saint-Saens, are "two-piano" numbers, which Cortot will play one part while the other part is played on the Duo-Art by means of a record reproducing his own playing.

Cortot has displayed his ability as an exceptionally skillful adapter of his work, "Litanie," by Schubert-Cortot. This is one of the compositions which he will play at the concert here.
