

COLISEUM

REAL flesh and blood spoofs have their lining in "Straight is the Way," the picture featuring Matt Moore and Gladys Leslie at the Coliseum. The story deals with the operations of two New York crooks who go to a small town on Long Island and accidentally learn that Aunt Mehitabel and her niece, Dorcas, are in the grip of a loan shark who is about to foreclose a mortgage he holds on their home. How they circumvent him by locating a treasure for the two women and how they are reformed, makes a delightful picture story.

While "Straight is the Way" is a so-called crook picture, the crook element is so lightly done that there is nothing at all melodramatic or depressing in the picture.

The leading roles, the two crooks who reform, are in the capable hands of Matt Moore and George Parsons, Gladys Leslie, a charming actress, who plays opposite Matt Moore, and Mabel Bert, who has the role of Aunt Mehitabel, a charming old widow.

Marc Klaw and A. H. Woods will exhibit films. Heretofore they have been interested only in the stage.

Doug and Mary, as well as Charles Chaplin, are considering the long-run system of presenting their plays.

Not of least import is the fact that \$250,000 weekly will be diverted from the stage to the film pocketbook next winter along Broadway.


