PATTERSON WOOD BLOCK PRINTS SENT TO BALTIMORE

Amrose Patterson, professor of art at the University, has been invited by the Baltimore Arts and Crafts Society to exhibit a set of his wood block prints at their exhibition. Mr. Patterson sent East eight prints, one of his much admired volcano, two of the palm trees, two of the cypress, and one of the Berkeley Campanile.

Two of Patterson's paintings have been hung this winter in the Macbeth Gallery of New York—considered a signal honor for an artist—and are now on their way home to be hung in the "One Man Show" Patterson is giving at the Fine Arts in June. The pictures were Maunakea Street in Honolulu, the center of the Chinese quarter, and the Market in Honolulu.

Patterson has just completed a sketch for an overmantel of an office of a lumber company in Hoquiam. It is a modern scene of industry, a train in the foreground, ships loading lumber and mills in the background, depicting the modern nature of the lumber industry. In the train smoke appears faintly a team of oxen studding logs in the old manner.

In honor of Mr. Patterson the Fine Arts Society will give a tea the opening night of his June exhibit.


