2 SHOTS HEARD ON WATER FRONT

Two separate firings of shots were heard on the waterfront early Wednesday, reported to police and investigated without the discovery of the cause. The watchman on Colman dock telephone to central station at 2 a. m. that a shot had been fired on Pier 2 and that a crowd was gathering. Motorcycle Patrolman J. B. Clark failed to find anything out of the ordinary at the pier. At 2:38 a. m. Patrolman W. D. Gibson heard a shot at Railroad ave. and Vine st. Patrolmen G. W. Norris and S. J. Jorgenson reported that they heard two shots in the neighborhood at the same time. Investigation was fruitless.

FALLING MAST KILLS BOATMAN

The body of Charles Anderson, fisherman, who was killed when struck by the mast of his yawl as the boat overturned off Harbor Island Tuesday afternoon, was at the morgue Wednesday, while Coroner W. H. Corson tried to get in touch with relatives. Anderson lived somewhere on the island. The body was recovered by Charles Sanderson, who witnessed the accident, and Capt. A. Jones of the harbor patrol. The yawl capsized in a brisk sea. Anderson's body was thrown into the water, but Coroner Corson said he believed death due to the blow on the head, rather than drowning.

MATERNITY BILL RE-INTRODUCED

WASHINGTON, May 4.—The maternity bill, first and pet measure of enfranchised women, has been re-introduced under its old name, the "Sheppard-Towner bill." Its prospects are said by Maud Wood Park to be good. "The president indorsed this bill by name in his message," said Mrs. Park, "so we are encouraged to hope that a congress fully controlled by the republicans will pass it promptly. The maternity bill is like that which failed in the special session, in its chief features. It appropriates \$10,000 a year to each of the 48 states to "start the work." Then it appropriates a million dollars to be apportioned among the states, in proportion to population, for educational and protective work. The new bill carries the Smoot amendment providing that the children's bureau be charged with the task of carrying out the provisions of the act. In the senate the bill was sent to Kenyon's committee on education. In the house it went to interstate commerce committee. The senate committee has already considered the bill and is preparing to report it promptly. The fight will no doubt come in the house. At the last session it was the house rules committee which gave the bill its death blow.

Boy Electrocutd Thru Fishing Rod

HARRISBURG, Ore., May 4.—Twelve-year-old Edwin Jensen met a spectacular death here late yesterday, when he was accidentally electrocuted and his body hurled 150 feet from a railroad trestle into the Willamette river. The lad was fishing from the trestle with a metal-tipped rod. In whipping it back, it came into contact with a trolley wire system carrying 60,000 volts. He was instantly killed and his body catapulted thru the air and into the water below. The accident occurred on the main line of the Oregon Electric railroad.

Splits Poll Tax "Pot" With State

Splitting the poll tax pot, County Treasurer William A. Gaines Tuesday sent State Treasurer C. L. Babcock \$86,118 and kept \$21,547 for King county. The divvy was confined to the April haul. May collections are going merrily on, employes having started to remit for employes by tapping "pay envelopes."
