## TENSE DRAMA IN MOVIE CONTEST

### Entries: Realize the Crucial Time Has Come

"Hello, hello! This is the first time in the history of the Universal contest that the winner of the grand prize will be a woman. It is a woman who has been chosen to represent the United States in the contest." —The Star-Universal Film company moving picture contest.

Every move and expression registered for the camera was watched and criticized by the contest judges searching for girls to put in the final round.

The contestants realized that the crucial period of the contest had been reached. Each "went the limit" portraying the emotions. At times the girls asked that the studio be cleared of onlookers, that they might go on undisturbed.

It was impossible, they said, to shed real tears with a doubtful audience looking on.

It is hoped the semi-finals will be completed by Saturday. The judges will then select the final girls. Probably all next week will be spent making the final tests and choosing the winner.

Solan yesterday reported before Judge Ward for re-sentencing. The court, after consideration, decreed that he should spend the next 25 years behind the bars.

## Legal Battle Ends in 25-Year Term

SAN FRANCISCO, May 12.—Joseph Solan, convicted of attempted burglary two years ago, was given an indeterminate sentence in San Quentin. The prison board, after considering the case, fixed the length of his term at seven and a half years.

Solan's attorney secured the release of his client on a writ of habeas corpus, declaring the indeterminate sentence law was not applicable in the case.

## May Demand Garage Men Report Leases

Owners of private garages leasing quarters to other persons for the storage of automobiles will be compelled to make a report of the transaction to the police department, if the city council looks favorably upon an ordinance now being prepared by the city attorney.

Lieut. J. P. Wickham, head of the police pawnshop detail, declared that the enactment of the ordinance would greatly assist the department in the recovery of stolen autos, many of which are stored for greater security in privately owned garages.

## Alaska to Spend \$700,000 on Roads

More than \$700,000 will be spent by the government in building new roads and maintaining established roads in Alaska, Capt. C. S. Ward, member of the Alaska road commission, stated Wednesday. Operations of the commission are considerably hampered by the marine strike, he stated.

## Bellevue District Club Heads Picked

J. T. Kardong was elected president of the Bellevue District Development club at a meeting held in the Bellevue clubhouse Wednesday night. Other officers chosen were: C. W. Graves, president; W. E. Lehuquet, secretary; and Hugh Martin, treasurer.

## Land Clearing Train Not to Tour State

The land clearing demonstration that was to have toured the state, showing farmers how to clear their farms of stumps, has been canceled. It was announced Wednesday by A. B. Nystrom, country agricultural agent. Some of the manufacturing concerns who were to stage demonstrations with their apparatus have backed down, it was stated.

FRONT CHANDELIERS

There is a display of dresses worn by living models. There were kiddie's games and toys. A man was hammering loudly, building a wardrobe trunk.

Away upstairs I found the "Wonderphone," a remarkable invention whose possibilities are boundless.

MAKES DEAF HEAR THRU THE MOUTH

Above is a small tank containing a clear, colorless liquid. Two tubes lead out of the bottom of the tank. One tube drips red ink, the other green.

Ranged on a table are the ingredients that go to make the ink. On a plate are half a dozen objects resembling hazel nuts, called nutgalls. From nutgalls two acids are obtained, gallic and tannic acid. These are essential in making inks.

"These nutgalls," explained the girl at the table, "come from India, China and Egypt. A wasp stings an oak tree, and the nutgall results, growing out like a small fungus."

Why can't an American wasp sting an American oak and produce a nutgall?

Only my grandma could answer that. "Because, if they could, little boys couldn't ask so many questions. Now run along."
