CITY ASKS CAR SUIT BE ENDED

Wants "Taxpayer" Action Dismissed Because they have not brought in the Puget Sound Light & Power Co. as co-defendants, as was ordered by Judge J. T. The taxpayers brought suit against the city to protect the general fund from inroads by the municipal railway. MAN DIES FROM GAS; SUICIDE?

Coroner W. H. Corson was trying, Thursday, to find relatives of Chas. Newman, 40, laborer, who was found dead from asphyxiation in a room in the Cascade hotel, 916 Howell st. Wednesday night. Newman apparently had committed suicide. Police-men broke into the room after tenants had noticed the smell of gas. They found the dead body floating freely from an open jet. All openings in the room had been stuffed with old rags. No money was found in the room. Newman left no note. He had been living at the hotel for two years. The body is at the county morgue.

NO ROOM FOR LAW-BREAKERS

So Says National Commander of Veterans "The man who has fought in the trenches or on the battlefield is the man who really knows and desires peace." This was the declaration of Robert G. Woodside, national commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, at a public meeting held at the Arena Wednesday night by experienced men of Seattle. "There is no room in America for those who come here and will not obey our laws," Woodside declared. The big gathering followed a parade of more than 7,000 marchers. Veterans of every war in which this country has engaged for the past 60 years were in the line of march. First and Second aves. were in gala attire in honor of the event, and fireworks and bombs added to the stirring effect. Thursday morning, a reception was held in the Armory for visiting delegations from other parts of the state, who are here to attend the organization of a separate department of the organization in Washington. Commander Woodside in all his efforts here is emphasizing the value of harmony among the various veterans' associations.
