### RICE CAKES

One cup boiled rice, 1 cup flour, 2 cups milk, 1 tablespoon butter, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 2 eggs. Add 1 cup milk to rice, cover and let stand over night. In the morning add flour, salt and baking powder. Beat eggs, add milk and butter and add to first mixture. Beat well and fry on a hot griddle.

### FRENCH FRIED ONIONS

Peel onions and cut in thin slices. Dip slices in an egg slightly beaten with 2 tablespoons milk. Cover with dried bread crumbs and fry in deep fat. Drain on brown paper and sprinkle with salt and pepper.
