Business and Professional Women's Club

On May 21, Mr. Samuel Hill, road builder and honorary member of the club, who has just returned from an extended tour of Europe, will address the Business and Professional Women's club regarding his recent travels and experience in Europe.

On Sunday, May 22, the summer home of the club will be formally opened at Pleasant Beach. The boat leaves for Pleasant Beach from Pier 3 at 9:30 o'clock Sunday morning. All club members are invited to visit this new summer camp of theirs either Sunday or Monday, and all are requested to bring their luncheon with them.

At the last meeting of the club Dr. Oliver H. Richardson, of the University of Washington, addressed the club on "History and the World War." By way of introducing his subject Dr. Richardson stated that he was going to take the club "for a whirl among the sharks and alligators of European diplomacy." In a most interesting and able presentation of his subject, Dr. Richardson emphasized the point that "history is an appeal to evidence and that the value of historical documents depends solely upon their authenticity."

In his clear and convincing discussion of the late world war, and in his presentation of new historical, official, documentary evidence concerning the origin of the late world war, Dr. Richardson pointed out two new authentic sets of documents that have brought much light on the events leading up to the war and some of the diplomatic relations during the war. These two remarkable sets of documents are the Kowly documents and the New Austrian Red Book, published in 1919. Some of the interesting information contained in these documents shows the Austrian policy and relations with Germany from June 23, 1914, to July 25, 1914, as depicted from the Austro-German viewpoint. The evidence contained in these documents enhances the guilt of Austria; fixes certain personal responsibilities; proves the sincerity of Sir Edward Gray's desire for peace; and proves the deliberate invasion of Germany into Belgium, yet relieves Germany from many charges." Dr. Richardson's lecture was not only interesting but instructive.

Last Thursday evening, May 19, the Grade Teachers' club entertained the Business and Professional Women's club with a delightful party, an interesting program, games, dancing and refreshments. The business women welcome this spirit of co-operation on the part of the teachers and feel that such has a viewpoint to give the other that is of mutual benefit.
