Subtract Al Jolson from "Sinned" and it would be like Bevo—no kick. With Jolson in the cast, the Shubert extravaganza has all the potency of laughing gas mixed with drug store gin.

Al arrived at the Metropolitan Sunday night for a four-day visit. He "knocked 'em out of their chairs" at the very opening of the battle and he kept up his rapid and sure fire drolery to the last gun.

Al is the Jack Dempsey of black-faced comedians. He is the originator of more eggs and theatrical stunts than any other man on the American stage. The only thing against the Winter Garden comedian is that he has ruined at least 1,452 vaudeville actors, who have attempted to imitate him.

Jolson is a fast and hard worker. He throws his hectic personality at the audience as if it were a custard pie. And he never fails to land. Ask for the vehicle, it is sufficient to keep the audience awake until Jolson returns to the stage. The scenic investiture is pleasing to the eye, and the big chorus is of the type that is guaranteed to charm and soothe the tired business man.

The musical score is in keeping with the buoyancy and speed of the rest of the production. However, if one has had a hard day at the office, one can doze when Jolson is off stage and not go home with a sense of having missed one of the seven wonders of the modern world.
