

# BRITTON RETAINS WELTERWEIGHT TITLE AFTER HARD MATCH

## SHADE KNOCKS CHAMP DOWN

PORTLAND, Oregon, June 4.—Dave Shade, the California panther, came within an ace of being the ace of the world's welterweights when he caught the champion, Jack Britton, with a right cross, sending him to the canvas, where he remained until the count of nine. Shade tried every ounce to put over the finishing blow, but the gong rang, ending the round in a draw. After battling for 30 minutes, Referee Harry Stout, imported from Milwaukee, Wis., called the bout a draw, much to the approval of the flaccid fishes that packed the Milwaukee Arena to witness the world's champion combat.

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## VARSAITY TO ENTER BIG MEET

Two and possibly more University of Washington men will take part in the first national intercollegiate track and field meet which will be held at Chicago June 18. Captain August ("Gus") Pope and Vic Hurley will certainly be sent to represent the Sun Dodgers at the big meet and if financial arrangements can be made other men will be sent.

**COACH MAY HAVE TWO MORE**  
One quarter-mile, Don Douglas or Reg Pratt, and one half-mile, Harry Bell or Marsh Davis, will have the first chance to make the trip if more men are chosen. Douglas and Pratt have been fighting for first honors all season, Douglas winning against Oregon here and last spring in the Coast conference quarter.

**BEALL HAS RUN THE HALF-MILE**

This is his first season on the varsity team. He started for the frons last year. Hurley is good for 25 seconds flat in the low hurdles, which is as fast as was made at the recent meet at Harvard. He has also made the century in 9-4.5 seconds, tying the Coast conference record. Ten flat is his consistent time in this race. In the two-twenty dash Hurley clips the distance in 32.5 or 33.4 seconds in his best form. He has had little real opposition in these races during the past season.
