



## RUSSIAN RELIEF SENDS OFF \$115

### Medical Supplies, Food and Clothing Wanted

The Russian Relief committee in a meeting at 1915 First ave. voted \$115 to be sent thru the American Friends Service committee of Philadelphia, for the purchase of food-stuffs to be shipped to Moscow, along with the medical supplies and surgical instruments which the committee has been collecting since it began to function about six weeks ago.

These supplies have been donated by Seattle physicians and druggists and are worth several hundred dollars. This is the first shipment made by the committee.

A statement of children's statistics in Moscow states that "25 per cent of the school children are afflicted with skin diseases and other troubles due to lack of soap, and infant mortality has risen to 40 per cent, due to the scarcity of milk."

"Of the children who live at home 33 per cent are tubercular or anemic."

Until America resumes trade with Russia, to enable her to secure the necessities for the maintenance of life, this relief work, altho only a drop in the bucket of need and want, is all that the friends of that nation can do.

Send money donations or bring in supplies to 1915 First ave. Anything in the way of new, warm children's clothing, soaps, medicines, Mellin's food, malted milk, etc., will be welcome.

Articles that are heavy and will require a large expenditure for freight are best bought in the East or in England and forwarded from there, but things that are light and useful may be advantageously shipped from here.
