Annuals Also to Be Seen at Rose Show

Wednesday the Rose Show is to be held in the University museum on the campus. It opens at 2 p. m. A special attraction will be the other flowers to be seen.

Opposite the entrance are three small rooms and here old-fashioned annuals from the garden borders will greet all visitors.

The Seattle Garden club last year had a table arranged with larkspur, snapdragon and small flowers. So much admired was this simple exhibit of old-fashioned favorites that this year the same club has invited districts such as West Seattle, University, North Park and Mount Baker Park each to decorate a table. The most attractive one will be awarded a medal. This is a very attractive medal, specially designed for the club by W. M. Somervell, a former Seattle architect, now in New York, and a son-in-law of the honorary president of the Garden club, Mrs. E. C. Hughes.

The three little rooms will be decorated with flowers and specially attractive window boxes, one of which is a copy of the prize-winning box of the New York flower show. In two will be placed the tables decorated by the different districts, in the other a collection of garden photographs.

Wayne Albee, of the McBride studio, spent Thursday of last week at the Highlands taking pictures of some of the lovely country gardens

there, and Sunday at the Country club. Many individuals from the various districts in town have sent in pictures from city gardens.

Mrs. Larrabee has sent pictures from Bellingham, Mrs. Carman from Tacoma, Mrs. Pratt from Everett, Mrs. Rodgers and Mr. Taylor from Vancouver and Mrs. Bouchart from her famous gardens in Victoria. Mrs. M. J. Carkeek has loaned a quaint print of her garden at Boren and Madison which used to comprise that half block, taken 20 years ago when hers was one of the few English type gardens in the town.

Many people ask why have a garden? To be sure it is a diversion old as the race, but why not do something more useful?

The answer is, you can express yourself with flowers just as the artist does in a picture. Everyone who has the right sort of garden love is instinctively artistic. Some people are taught to express the artistic side of their nature with brush and color, others thru other forms of art expression, but it falls to many who have not had technical training to express themselves in flowers, perhaps more elusive, delightful and incidental than any other form.

With the atmospheric moisture we have here, the soil and general climatic conditions, it is probably likely that we have greater potentiality of garden expression than any other section.

The Garden club hopes the exhibit will be an inspiration to Seattle gardeners. Already thru the initiative of the club, with the cordial cooperation of the Highlands community and property owners along the road, the Golf club road has been lined with poplars, some day to be as lovely as the famous drives of Paris and Brussels.

The club also interested the rail-

way officials in beautifying the King and C.V. stations with window boxes and in planting shrubs and bay trees on the station grounds so that the first and last impression of all visitors will be agreeable.

At the Rose show it will also be a handsome silver vase as a gift for the most artistic basket of flowers shown.
