CHIEF TO BE NAMED

Pugilist May Be Selected to Enforce Law at the Navy Yard Town

BREMERTON, June 30.—While affidavits were being prepared today on which to base new charges of graft against Police Chief Frank Reynolds, the city council was on the eve of appointing a new chief and Mayor E. H. Bowdoin issued an order forbidding acceptance of bail money from prisoners by policemen.

THIEVES GET \$2,300 HAUL

Approximately \$2,300 in jewelry, cash and papers were taken by apartment house thieves in two daring burglaries Wednesday night.
Ruth Hill, who lives at 114 Fifth ave., N., was robbed of personal papers valued at \$1,600; two diamond rings, valued at \$200; a pair of diamond cuff links valued at about \$30; a diamond lavalliere, value \$125; a moonstone ring, valued at about \$20, and cash amounting to \$20, when a thief ransacked her apartment, early Thursday.
Her aunt, who was with her, awoke at 4:30, finding a strange man in the room.
She asked him what he wanted. The man excused himself by saying he was in the wrong apartment.
Thieves who entered the room of D. Toplis, 114 Fifth ave., N., are believed to be the men responsible for the robbery of Miss Hill. While Toplis slept, they took \$55 in cash, two valuable diamond rings, diamond cuff links, and left five valuable watches in a bureau drawer. Toplis reported the loss Thursday to police.

FORD IN BIG NEW SPHERE

May Purchase U. S. Nitrate Plant and Make It Profitable Enterprise

DETROIT, June 30.—Henry Ford is preparing to complete the economic cycle of his industrial empire by buying the government's \$100,000,000 nitrate plant at Muscle Shoals, Ala.

WILL RAISE WAGES AS OTHER LINES CUT
Ford will buy more railroads later on.
On July 1, when other railroads are to cut wages of unskilled labor 12 per cent, Ford will raise wages an average of 40 per cent on his railroad, establishing a minimum wage of \$5 a day.
Soon Ford's River Rouge plant will begin making locomotives of a new type that he expects to cut in half the cost of motive power.

2 SUSPECTS IN ROBBERY HELD

Frank Lefooski and Theodore Wirsinski were arrested Thursday as suspects in the robbery of Nels Anderson and Julius Playfield between Maple Valley and Hobart Wednesday and confessed to Sheriff Matt Starwich as to their part in the theft.
Three men Wednesday entered the home of Anderson and Playfield, took \$120 and three watches, then beat Anderson, 65, over the head with a gun.
Thursday Lefooski and Wirsinski were picked up near Maple Valley by Deputies Campbell, Brewer, Bundy and Sheriff Starwich. Each had \$40, one-third of the amount of money taken the day before, on his person, while Wirsinski carried a gun, which was still clogged with blood on the inside of the hammer.
The men told of plans to "pull" a bigger "job" at Ravensdale later in the day, but were apprehended. They are suspected by police officials to be implicated in several recent highway robberies. Sheriff states that he knows the identity of the third man in the case.

Excitement Over Glove Battle Is Increasing Daily

Sport Fans Everywhere Are Eagerly Awaiting International Clash Between Carpenter and Dempsey Saturday

The attention of the world is riveted today on Jersey City.
No sporting event in history ever evoked the interest aroused by the Dempsey-Carpenter fight. How it has stirred the people everywhere was revealed today in the following cablegrams to the United Press:

LONDON, June 30.—John Bull today believed Georges Carpentier has an even chance of tearing the heavyweight crown from Jack Dempsey's head.
Interest in the fight of July 2 crept over England like a slow fever. Displaying only slight symptoms of interest a week ago, the British interest today with speculation as to the outcome. Betting, at first stagnant, increased as the hour for the fight drew nearer.
The general public here favors Carpenter to win, altho its money does not say so very loudly.
Carpentier's exhibitions here have left the impression that he is the boxing marvel of the age.
"He could knock out two British boxers in the same ring," followers of the game declared.
Dempsey was looked upon as an unknown quantity. His record of quick victories impressed the sporting fraternity but little. Pictures in the newspapers here and in the shop windows show Dempsey to be a huge, heavily muscled man.
"Dangerous if he lands," conceded one follower of the sport, "but he can't land on Carpenter. Beckett was the same sort. If he hit a man that man dropped. But he didn't Carpenter."

Dempsey Favorite in Rome Betting

ROME, June 30.—Jack Dempsey was a 2-to-1 favorite here today to win from Georges Carpentier next Saturday.
The betting was unprecedented for a boxing event. Italians like the races and enjoy staking their money, but ordinarily they are "cold" to prize ring. But this match might be

FAVOR CARPENTIER IN SOUTH AFRICA

CAPTOWN, South Africa, June 30.—Somewhat disturbed by cables stating that New York odds are 3 to 1 on Dempsey to win his fight with Carpenter next Saturday, Britishers continued to lay their money on the Frenchman today.
Cables will bring fairly complete returns of the fight late in the evening.

BRAZIL IS BETTING ON CARPENTIER

RIO DE JANEIRO, June 30.—No event in recent years has brought such a demand for information as the Dempsey-Carpenter fight. Brazil, a Latin country, is backing Carpenter almost to a man, altho American money placed on Dempsey cannot get odds.
Papers which never before troubled themselves with sporting news have been compelled by popular interest to devote columns to the forthcoming fight. Pictures of the two pugilists have made their faces and figures familiar to all Brazilians.
BUENOS AIRES IS DIVIDED IN OPINION
BUENOS AIRES, June 30.—Sentiment here was almost evenly divided today between Carpenter and Dempsey.
Large British and American colonies led the dispute over the abilities of the two fighters. Argentines gave their full sympathy to Carpenter, but on the strength of New York cables demanded odds from Dempsey backers.
Newspaper are arranging the most complete service ever ordered for an event of this sort.

SYDNEY FANS ARE ALL FOR DEMPSEY

SYDNEY, N. S. W., June 30.—Familiarity with American boxers who have fought here frequently today caused odds to favor Jack Dempsey in his fight with Carpenter.

CHARGE GIANT THEFT!

Building Company Employe Caught at Border of Canada

H. W. Robinson, bookkeeper for the F. T. Crowe Co., Seattle, dealers in building material, was being returned to Seattle Thursday, following his arrest in Vancouver, B. C., Wednesday, charged with embezzling \$10,000 of the company's funds.
The alleged shortage was discovered when the monthly inspection of the company's files was made.
Robinson, it is claimed, was attempting to enter Washington from British Columbia with a woman said not to be his wife. He was trying to return in time to cover his shortage. It is alleged.
His well-laid plans, however, were upset by Canadian authorities, who objected to his traveling alone with the woman, and arrested him.
While he was held there, the shortage was discovered here, and the charge of embezzlement was placed against him.
Robinson is accused of forging the counter signature of checks made payable to himself and transferring the money of the company to his own banking account.

3D ARREST IN BALL SWINDLE

The third alleged baseball gambler to be arrested in two weeks, E. L. Moore, 26, window cleaner, held on a charge of forgery in the city jail, is alleged to have confessed Thursday to detectives his gambling operations in which he swindled hundreds of Seattle men with a fake lottery game.
Moore's system was to peddle lottery tickets in pool halls at 50 cents each, betting on two teams in the National, American and Coast leagues, the victim placing his bets on two teams to make the highest score of the day in their respective leagues. A large amount of tickets were seized by Detectives R. R. Herbert and E. Yoris Tuesday night.
Moore was originally arrested for passing worthless checks in a fake advertising scheme. He will be tried on a charge of first degree forgery.

FOREIGNERS IN HANKOW FLEEING

HANKOW, China, June 30.—The foreign population of Hankow was fleeing for safety today, fearing impending mutinies of Chinese troops.
One thousand Japanese troops were reported planning to remain in the city. Other foreign concessions, however, were being evacuated.
Taking advantage of the situation created by the presence of two governments in China, various provincial governors are reported putting armies in the field for the purpose of looting.
Reports here indicated thousands were killed in mutinies recently.

PLAN TO SELL WOODEN FLEET

WASHINGTON, June 30.—The United States shipping board has decided definitely to dispose of the 287 wooden ships of the emergency fleet corporation, it was announced today.
Bids will be opened July 30.
The fleet is now riding in the James river, in Lake Union at Seattle and New York bay.
Robert H. Montgomery, New York, has been appointed to make a survey of the shipping board finances, it was announced.
