D., farmer. Loebe has a wife and three children. A few weeks ago he visited Kansas City. In a restaurant he met Melissa Dawson, a waitress. He says she told him she would like to live on a farm. He hired her and brought her back to his ranch. A few days ago Mrs. Loebe and the children went to Denver on a visit. Loebe charges that it was during this time that Melissa produced a box of chocolates and made him eat them. Loebe felt sleepy soon afterward. He alleges he knew nothing more until he awoke in a Sioux City hotel and found Melissa by his side. She told him they were married and produced a marriage certificate from the day before. He told her to leave. She did so, but when she left he found she had taken with her \$4,800. Loebe returned to find an indignant wife waiting for him. A few days later Melissa turned up at the Loebe farm again. She says Loebe made love to her in the

Kansas City restaurant and that he told her his first marriage was only a common law affair and that he would marry her. She is preparing a suit for \$10,000 heart balm. Loebe holds two marriage certificates, but can't get either wife to talk to him.

Lightly Clad Fugitive Given Battle


