DETROIT WOMAN MAY BE CHOSEN

Business and Professional Women Ask Re-Election

CLEVELAND, July 22.—Mrs. Lena Lake Forest, of Detroit, was recommended today for re-election as president of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's clubs, by the nominating committee of the third annual convention being held here. Other nominations included:

Miss Lota E. Kelly, Raton, N. M., first vice president; Miss Fitzpatrick, Salina, Kan., corresponding secretary.

California has withdrawn from the national federation.

Miss Gail Laughlin, San Francisco attorney and former president, charged that the federation acted irregularly by instituting a petition day, without notifying federation members 30 days in advance of the convention.

"The instance is but one of the violations," said Miss Laughlin. "We shall have no further participation in the convention."

The majority side of the convention denies the incorporation was without due notice. The incorporation committee was given power to act at the last convention. The federation is incorporated under the laws of New York.

"The convention will close today."

WHO WON THE WAR? HERE'S THE WHOLE DOPE, BOYS, LISTEN!

PARIS, July 22.—The question of who won the war has been decided finally, according to the newspaper *Leclair*.

Printing what purported to be an interview with former Premier Clemenceau, the paper quoted him as saying:

"America does not understand by what terrific efforts I won the war.

"I had to fight three battles, the first against the boches, the second against the divided allies, and the third against the French chamber, which had lost hope. "But I won."

Asks Investigation of Federal Reserve

WASHINGTON, July 22.—At the request of Governor Harding of the federal reserve board, Senator McLean, Connecticut, today introduced a resolution for a Senate investigation of the board and of the office of the comptroller of the currency.

Harding's request was the result of frequent and violent criticism of the board and its policy, both in congress and out. Inclusion of the comptroller's office was based on recent attacks on the board by John Steel Williams, former comptroller.

BABY FALLS IN SOUND, DROWNS

Left Alone, Child Tumbles Into 3 Feet of Water

Philip Simpson, one-and-a-half-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Simpson of Tacoma, was drowned at 6 p. m. Thursday when he fell from a six-foot boat head into Puget sound at Magnolia beach on Vashon island.

The boy had been playing with his brother and sister, who left him alone for a few moments while they went to a store nearby. He fell in three feet of water, and was dead when found, a short time later. The body will be taken to Tacoma.

According to the coroner's office, this is the first drowning to occur at Magnolia beach.

PARSON HITS SOGGY TRAIL

DENVER, July 22.—"Parson" J. A. Hazel, colored, head of the People's Presbyterian flock here, has an uncontrollable ambition to be a peddler of moonshine, rather than a savior of souls, his congregation alleges in charges filed here today.

The parson's alleged tendencies have disturbed the "peace and harmony" of the church, it was stated in the petition. His time is taken up with distribution of home-made whiskey, rather than affairs of the church, it is claimed.


