


Middle Champ Fights

Ortega will have an advantage of a few pounds in weight over Murphy.


FAVORITES WIN AT NEWPORT

Comebacks Flirt With Title Coin

Adams and Baker Have Fine Chances to Figure in Big Money This Fall

BACK from baseball graves to get their share in this year's world series? Is that what Babe Adams, of the Pirates, and Frank Baker, of the Yankees are up to?

Of course, neither the Pirates nor the Yankees have cinched pennants, but both clubs are "sitting pretty."

Frank Baker pitched in one world's series in 1919, when the Detroit Tigers and the Pittsburgh Pirates clashed. Adams won three games and Pittsburgh was declared the world's champion club.

BAKER STARS WITH BAT
Baker has starred in more than one. He was the home-run king when the Athletics were copping annually. He was known as a money player—doing his best work in the big series.

But Baker and Adams were both counted out. And in sports it is common to say that a man can't come back. Daily accounts of games played in the two big leagues include favorable mention of the two veterans.

Adams is one of the stalwarts of the Pirates, as he was in 1919. And Baker is battling in the Detroit Yankees, need no badly in their fight with Cleveland.

Babe Adams is 38 years old and began pitching in 1904, with Parsons, Kan.

BAKER IS 35 YEARS OLD
Frank Baker is 35 years old and had been out of baseball for a year when the Yankees took him back this spring.

Frank always was a clean-living farmer boy and the year and a half off the diamond didn't hurt him. He's the Frank Baker of old-time series, "One more slice of the world's grain melon," says Frank.

He's been close to series money several times since leaving Connie Mack, but seems a little nearer this season than in any other.

Ruth Is Still Breaking Long Hitting Marks

Babe Ruth is making long-distance hits with records one after another.

On June 13 and 14 he drove two record homers into the center field bleachers at the New York Polo grounds. They taped 466 feet each.

June 25 at Boston he sent the ball two-thirds the way up into the right field stands—the longest drive ever made in that city.

Babe's 35th homer, made in St. Louis July 15, sailed over the center field bleachers and landed in the street for the St. Louis record.

And in Detroit July 17 he punted his 36th over the fence in center field, fully 100 feet further than his 466-foot record made at the Polo grounds.

On July 25 the Yankees journeyed to Cincinnati for an exhibition game and Bambino cracked one over the center field wall and another into the right field bleachers—both feats being records for the Redland park.

HERE'S NIFTY FABER BOOST

Oscar C. Reichow, dean of Chicago baseball writers, says that Urban Faber, White Sox hurling ace, has more stuff than any White Sox pitcher ever showed, not barring Ed Walsh. Which is quite some boost. Faber's stunt in turning in 20 wins during the first half of the season is a truly wonderful record.

SHOTTEN MAY LEAD SYRACUSE

Bert Shotten, veteran big league outfielder, may break into the managerial game as pilot of Syracuse in the International league, according to reports from the East. Shotten is with the St. Louis Cardinals at present.

AINSMITH IS WITH TOLEDO

Eddie Ainsmith, veteran big league catcher, who was recently let out by the Detroit Americans, has joined the Toledo club in the American association.

MADE ARRIVES ON MAINLAND

YANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 2.—Harry Shade, of San Francisco, middleweight champion of Australia, is here after a 12 month's stay in the English island possessions. Before leaving, Shade weighed 150 pounds and he now weighs 135.
