**OBSERVE THESE RULES**

- 1.—Any man, woman, girl or boy living in the state of Washington, but residing outside of Seattle, who is not an employee of The Seattle Star or a member of an employer's family may submit an answer. It costs nothing to try.
- 2.—All answers must be mailed by September 3, 1921, and sent to Glenn S. Morten, Puzzle Manager, Seattle Star.
- 3.—Answers should be written on one side of the paper only, and numbered consecutively, 1, 2, 3, etc. Write your full name and address on each page, in the upper right hand corner. If you desire to write anything else, use a separate sheet.
- 4.—Only words found in the English Dictionary will be counted. Do not use hyphenated, compound or obsolete words. Use either the singular or plural, but where the plural is used, the singular cannot be counted, and vice versa.
- 5.—Words of the same spelling can be used only once, even though used to designate different objects. The same object can be named only once; however, any part of the object may also be named.
- 6.—The answer having the largest and the nearest correct list of names of visible objects shown in the picture, that begin with the letter "R" will be awarded first prize, etc. Neatness, style or handwriting have no bearing upon deciding the winners.

- 7.—Candidates may co-operate in answering the puzzle, but only one prize will be awarded to any one household; nor will prizes be awarded to more than one of any group outside of the family where two or more have been working together.
- 8.—In the event of a tie for any prize offered, the full amount of such prize will be paid to each tied participant.
