

TO DEMAND INDICTMENT FOR MURDER

Prosecutor Is Expected to Hold Abe Evans in Ducharme Case

THE DALLES, Ore., Sept. 13.—That District Attorney Galloway, of Wasco county, will demand an indictment under a charge of first degree murder for Abe Evans, alleged robber-murderer, when the grand jury convenes, September 13, appeared certain here today.

Evans was brought from Madras late, yesterday and is in jail here. He denies all knowledge of the crime, claiming to have left James Doran, the man he is charged with murdering and robbing, and William Ducharme, the man he is said to have shot thru the shoulder at a local hotel and to have returned toward Bend, whence he had driven with the two men as passengers.

The automobile driven by Evans has been brought here, however, and, according to officers, the tire treads clearly are the same as those that were found in the dirt road near where Doran dropped dead with five bullets in his body.

Evans also was found to have \$135 on his person, \$50 in the toe of one shoe and \$85 sewn in a trousers cuff. Doran, whose pockets were rifled when the body was discovered, was known to have had between \$100 and \$150 on his person.

Evans is said to have been charged at several times with attempts to hold up passengers, whom he was taking to a destination in his "for hire" car.

RAIL EMPLOYEES MEET SUNDAY

60,000 Will Gather After Vote Against Wage Cut

CHICAGO, Sept. 13.—Sixty thousand railway employees will meet here Sunday to consider the present wage difficulties with the roads.

The announcement of the meeting was made today by Bert M. Jewell, president of the railroad department of the American Federation of Labor. Jewell, who is to address the membership, would not reveal the nature of his speech.

The meeting was called in view of the fact that shop employees all over the country have voted overwhelmingly against acceptance of the wage cut that went into effect July 1.

The child remains in the Spiker home, while his mother has disappeared, leaving a note declaring that she does "not care to live with Guy Spiker any more."

A circus came to town today. And Poodles, the clown, ran away! But they have Poodles under guard now out at the Sells-Floto circus grounds. Poodles, whose last name is Hannaford, is the world's greatest clown and horseback rider. He is the main feature under the big top, as the circus men say. "Nevertheless, this clown business is a pretty tame and monotonous job," Poodles was heard to say to the lad who "sells cherries on the come-out," "and I'm gonna find something more exciting than horses." And with that Poodles disappeared. **MASTER MIND OF CIRCUS FINDS HIM** Circus folk organized the razor-backs, candy butchers, clowns, gymnasts, acrobats and all, to find their Poodles. It was a hunt that would do honor to Roy Gardner.

All circuses have a master mind. "Doc" Stuart, of Sells-Floto, holds that distinction. "Doc" found the truant clown Poodles in the act of climbing into the huge flying boat of the Pacific Airways Co., at Madrona park, Tuesday morning. "Hey! Come outa that—Jyah, hear me!" exploded "Doc." "D'ya wanna get killed and bust up our circus?" "Aw, gwan!" sauced Poodles. "I've been riding horses all my life, and I ain't never ridden one of these things, and what's more, this aviator has dared me to. You can tell the boss out at the big top that his Poodles will get back for the regular performance. Now, get out of my way—I'm going to fill this guy's dare!" "Aw, Poodles," pleaded "Doc." But Poodles had gone. **2,000 FEET UP—AND DARE IS REPEATED** At 2,000 feet above Seattle and above Poodles' home, the circus, Aviator Avery Black, of the Pacific Airways Co., repeated his dare to Poodles to climb out on the wing and write his name on top of the plane. "Gee, I wish I was back on a horse!" blinked Poodles, as he peered over the side of the flying boat and saw things as toys. "Tell my family and the boss at the circus that I died game, and that if I get back safe I'll ride horses and

won't run away again. And tell 'Doc' I won't sass him any more—if I don't get back—here goes." Poodles climbed out on the wing, clutching at each strut and never once looking down—always up. The flying boat made a steep bank and Poodles was seen to gasp. "Horror!" yelled Poodles. "Straighten your dowses! flying machine, or I'll never see another horse." "You're a swell daredevil, f'are," teased Pilot Black. "Let's see ya write your name on the upper wing." **SPARS FOR TIME** THEN "COMES ACROSS" Poodles scowled and sparred for time, and then, true to the name of Poodles, the great bareback rider dived up the end strut to the top wing, and with a piece of chalk wrote his name, unflinching, and with some accuracy, on the top wing of the plane. "It will be Poodles' last ride in an airplane—the rummy!" declared the boss of the big show. "He has got to stick to horses." "I'll always remember Pilot Black and the Pacific Airways Co. and Madrona park. Madrona park is about the nicest I'll park I've seen since I got back to earth," declared Poodles Tuesday. "I like the swings and street cars and docks and things."
