## Star's Art Critic Reviews' Windows With Style Jury

It was an artistic series of pictures worthy of admiration quite apart from the merchandise offered for sale. CAN CREATE ATMOSPHERE IN WINDOW DISPLAYS. And one thing it conclusively proved was that if a store creates its atmosphere in its window display it will attract its kind of customers. The individual merchandise shown is seldom sold directly from the window to the customer.

The winners were impossible to choose after one afternoon trip and the jury adjourned in order to have a night view and an early morning look before voting on the prize winners. One thing they evidently agreed upon—that the whole was dramatic, stirring and attractive, infinitely superior to the windows of other shops in a small way three years ago.

It was an open secret that the Fraser-Paterson windows fascinated everyone. They were not only beautiful, but clever and unusual, and successfully surmounted many difficulties.

Incidentally they conveyed the message Park has tried to send over—that black is "the thing" this season. Especially at night these windows are gorgeous.

RESORT TO STRATEGY IN VARYING SIZE. The size was varied by cleverly taping the windows down, a most unusual trick for a department store, usually too eager for extended areas of plate glass.

One figure you glimpse edge on, and the other mysteriously thru a haze of gauze batted curtaining. These plate windows have an unfortunate jointing in the middle, which is cleverly outwitted by placing the exhibit to one side, balancing it with an iron grating, an illuminated bowl of gold fish, or a swinging seat.

The black tile mirror-like floor of the corner window is a masterpiece, all the more for its reflection of the sparkling figure in a startling manner. From points of view of color, composition, lighting effect and originality everyone praised Fraser-Paterson's windows.

Frederick & Nelson had the most gorgeous display of any shop. The entire block of windows was brilliant with wonderful and expensive batik and tie-dye hangings arranged against a carefully detailed Moorish background.

The turquoise blue window was perhaps the loveliest. The idea was clever and lovely and the rippling color would perhaps have been a shade more poetic as a background for merchandise if a little less insistent, as it could be if partially veiled under a gauze curtain. The really wonderful merchandise was put in the background, not only because of the color effect, but because of the distracting, lovely Oriental rugs.

PEACOCK WINDOW EFFECTIVE AT NIGHT. The Bon Marche's peacock window gave an effective impression at night, especially, having the figure elevated so the crowd could see well.

MacDougal's had a dressing room scene very attractive in spite of the overshadowing background. Rhodes had to be examined in detail, as an impression of the whole was hard to get on account of the overlapping spaces of plate glass that presented the different "pictures" from being enframed.

Of the specialty shops Graham's attracted particular attention for the grey haired lady so alluringly attired in a marvelous green beaded dress and grey squirrel coat. After all many a grey haired lady would be glad to dress up if all the clothes were not for the perfect thirty-sixes. And besides, they usually are the patrons with pocketbooks. The other window was for youth alone—most startling clothes. Igo had one quaint frock every sub-deb would love.

Carman's upstairs display in the second story windows, only to be seen well at night from across the street, was unusually charming.
