DIGNIFIED AND BEAUTIFUL was the setting for the wedding of Miss Katherine Shank, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Corwin Sheridan Shank to Mr. Arthur Trumbull Lee, son of Rev. George H. Lee and Mrs. Lee, which was solemnized last evening at 8:30 o'clock in the First Baptist Church; Rev. George H. Lee, the groom's father, performing the ceremony, assisted by Rev. Ambrose M. Bailey, pastor of the church.

Pink and green was the color scheme used in decorating. The high standards of the center aisle were richly lighted, held up by sprays of asparagus ferns meeting to form an archway. The choir loft was banked with palms in the light of many cathedral tapers. Palms and low standards of dahlias and gladioli flanked the pulpit and semi-circular edifice, while the balcony was festooned with greens, dahlias and wall pockets of dahlias.
